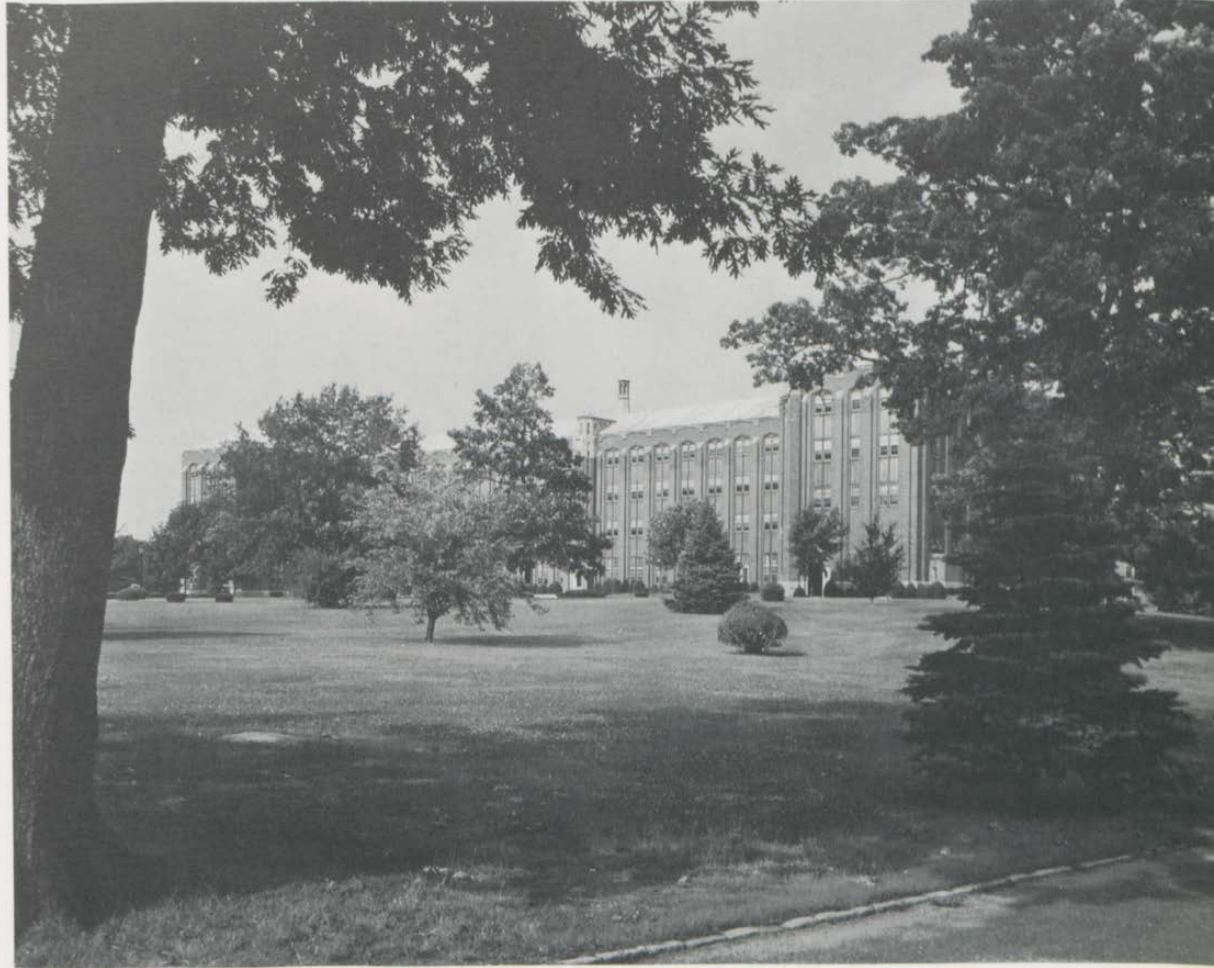




Remember...

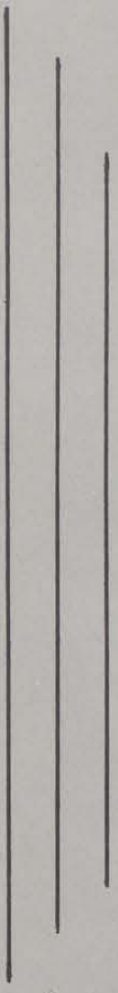




Visualize . . .

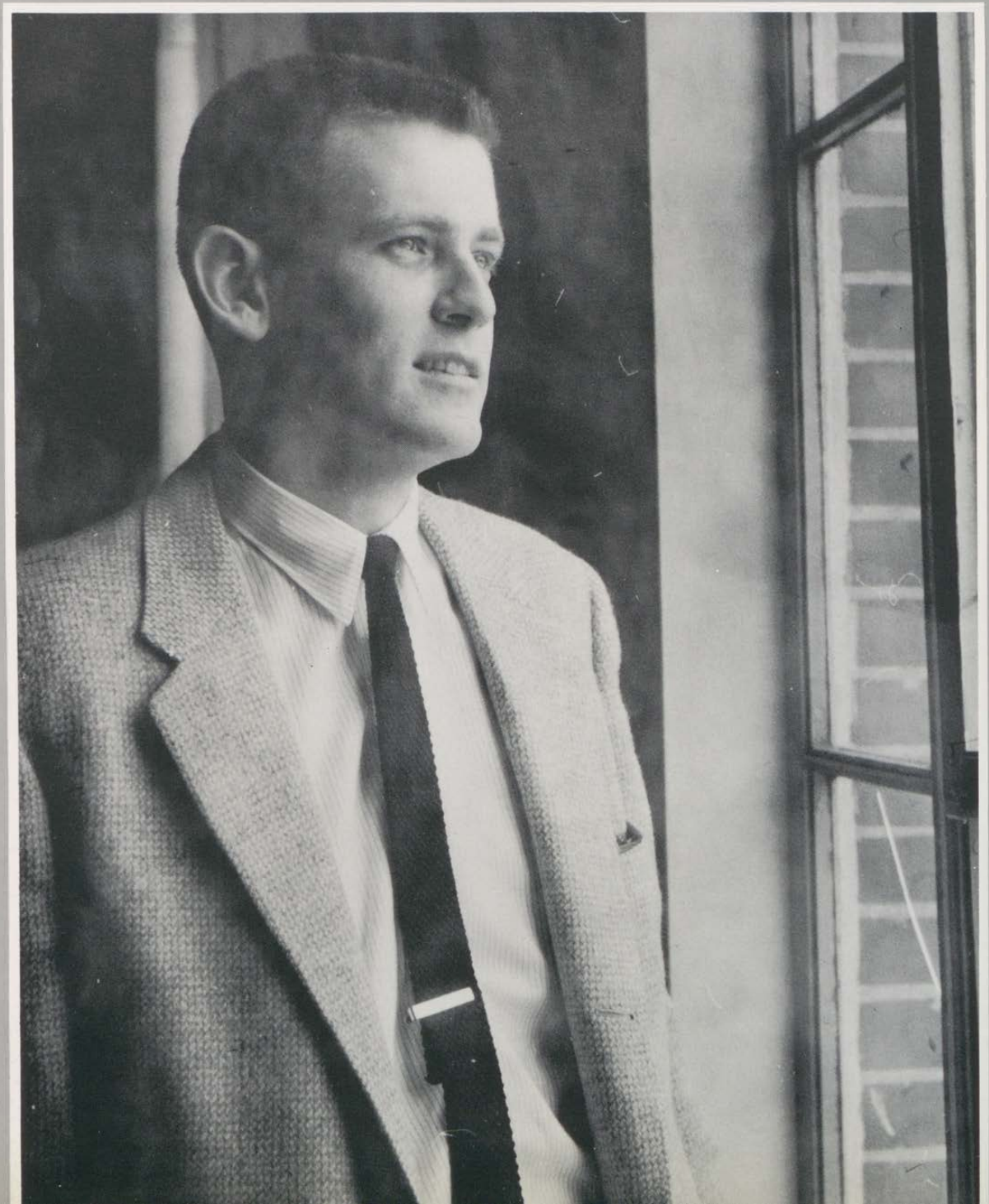
From any window there is a view of the campus, and in the afternoon the rotunda is cool and peaceful . . .

From that night you became part of the Social whirl. They came in quick succession, the Friars Formal, the Military Ball, the biggest night of all, the Junior Prom.

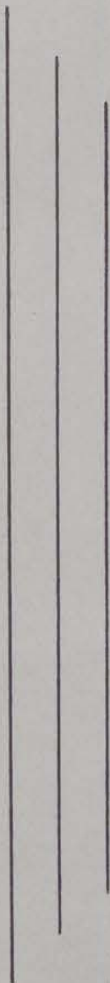

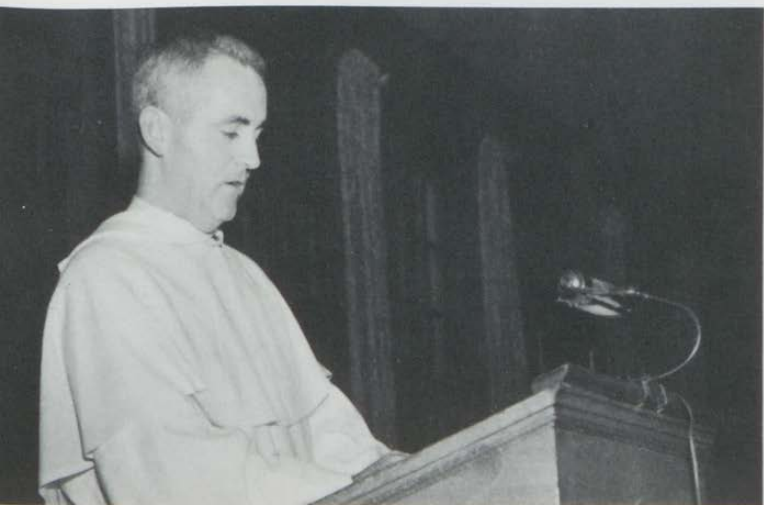




Recall...

As Father Bergkamp has so often defined it, History is an explanation of how things came to be what they are today. In this brief history of the Class of 1958, it is doubtful whether one can explain the growth, progress and accomplishments of our class as fully as might be desired. The most important factor, spirit, defies being committed to paper, and in the following resume of our activities during the last four years will be found only by reading between the lines.

It was in the Fall of 1954 that we entered Providence College. We were welcomed on campus by the Student Congress and introduced to the College president, Father Slavin. Our Moderator, Father Lennon, impressed upon us in his welcoming address what the College expected from its students, and provided us with the incentive to survive the following day's series of Reserve Officers Training Corps lines, lectures, forms and examinations.

Survive we did, and, doughty little lads that we were, proudly donned the insignia of our caste, our beanies. No one dared appear on campus without his, and a few conscientious souls even wore theirs to class. With complete disregard for the teachings of Mrs. Post, our betters (insufferable boors) required that we wear beanies even while dining in the cafeteria (horribile dictu!). And the cafeteria in those days was an antediluvian relic in which the tables were so high that one was forced to stand during meals. We were Spartans in our youth . . . the young people these days lead a pretty soft life with their beautiful new cafeteria (which, in truth, we welcomed).

With the first issue of the Cowl came invitations from the campus clubs, publications and societies to join the ranks of their members. Many of us took advantage of these invitations and it was in these many organizations that we first made our influence felt on campus as we were accepted as an integral part of the College. On October 22, we arose as full-fledged P.C. men at the Liberation Dance when we discarded our beanies forever.

The most rewarding of our extracurricular activities during the Fall of 1954 was our work for the Providence College Progress Fund, which was officially launched under the direction of Father McKenna. As Freshmen we held our own in the competition with the upper-classmen as "flying squadrons" were sent out to canvass the state in raising the means to improve the physical plant of the College.

Occasionally we found time to study when extracurricular activities slowed down to a walk. We had a few subjects in common and these were often the basis for open discussion. Military Science was always a good subject for interesting and controversial conversation. Sergeants Passwater and Allen deserve a Congressional Medal for surviving the ordeal of trying to teach Freshmen the intricacies of Military Science. But they didn't excell in fortitude Father Putz who introduced us to Theology. In point of fact, it is possible that the Freshman year is harder on the faculty than it is on the students.

Our first encounter with politics came in January, 1955, when our class elections were held. Competition was keen among the four parties, the Vericratic, the Square Deal, the Unity and 4-4-U Parties, and was made keener by the fact

that all platforms were basically similar, which is to say non-existent. On the strength of the fact that their candidates knew the greater number of voters, it was the Vericratic Party which emerged victorious, and Mike McIntyre, Jim Hagan, Dick Kerr, and Larry Mailloux were our officers for the remainder of the year. Later, in the Student Congress elections, Joe Dolan, George Riley, Bill Galvin and Ed Maggiacomo were shown to have attained sufficient popularity to become elected to the Student Congress as delegates from the Freshman class.

The sports news during our Freshman year was somewhat less than what might have been desired. The basketball team, playing in the Mount Pleasant Gym, had only a fair season, but the promise of things to come was in the air; Alumni Hall was almost completed and Mr. Joseph Mullaney had been put under contract to coach the Friar quintet for the following season. The hockey team, playing their last season on an informal basis, turned in a rather unimpressive record, but upset victories over Brown and Clarkson showed that the team had a great potential.

Our social activities during the first year were highlighted by the Freshman Dance which had as its singularly delightful theme "Roman Holiday," from the movie of the same name. Joe McNeill and Gerry Salesses were co-chairmen for the event, and, with the aid of Tony Tatulli and the members of the Dance Committee, they were able to afford us with a resounding triumph as our first major dance. The invitation to Audrey Hepburn was lost in the preparatory turmoil, but we were content with having a working decorative fountain as the *piece de resistance* in our Roman Garden. Thereunto, it was the best party we ever was to, and a good time was had by all.

The first of the many scholastic awards which our class was to earn were received in the Spring of that year by George Riley and Gary Mennitt, when they were named the outstanding Freshmen in their concentrations. During the period from May 25 to June 3, we demonstrated to ourselves and each other why we hadn't all received awards, as we ground our way through the final examinations. When the smoke and fury had subsided on the academic battlefield, a few casualties were to be seen and our numbers had been decreased, but *de mortuis nihil nisi bonum*.

Wisdom perfects the man, and, returning for the Sophomore year, we believed that we had been perfected a great deal, but that was nothing more than that most cosmopolitan of absurdities, the sanguine credulity of youth. We were young and impressionable at the time and so may be pardoned if we failed to realize that we would be ever so much wiser in our Senior Year. However, we enjoyed a dubious superiority over the new Freshmen on campus.

As we had changed during the vernal hiatus, so had the campus. Two new dormitories, St. Joseph and Stephen Halls, were opened that year, and the new two and one-half million dollar gymnasium was completed. This last was named Alumni Hall in recognition of the most generous contributions of the College's alumni in helping to improve facilities on campus. Evidently the Alumni could not forget the stand-up cafeteria, for a luxurious modern cafeteria was one of the most brilliant features of the new building.

CLASS HISTORY

The Fall of our Sophomore year saw the institution of a tradition newly-legislated by the Student Congress—the Annual Tug of War. This is a highly ingenious system, said to be based on an ancient Patagonian jousting ritual, in which representative corpulent members of the party of the first part, the Sophomore class, attempt to dislodge, in a manner which consists of the collective tugging or pulling on a stout rope or some such instrument fabricated of any material of proven pliability, which instrument shall be selected and provided by duly appointed members of the Student Congress at the expense of said Congress, the footing of an equal number of representative corpulent members of the party of the second part, the Freshman class, who are tugging or pulling on the aforesaid stout rope or some such instrument fabricated of any material of proven pliability, thereby to deprive the entire party of the second part of the privilege of discarding their distinctive headgear at a date which shall be determined by the aforesaid Student Congress and which shall be previous to that date which has already been designated by the aforesaid Student Congress as the date upon which the party of the second part might with official sanction discard their distinctive headgear, thus superceding any previous legislation pertinent to or treating of the care, maintenance and/or discarding of distinctive headgear by the members of the party of the second part. A detailed description of this first historic contest would be far too long for inclusion in this brief history, and indeed, might even be too involved for those readers unacquainted with the subtleties and complexities of this ancient sport. Then, too, the Freshmen won.

Class elections were held early in the year and we elected Jim Hagan, Marty Bartley, Noel Doyle, and Dave Roche to office. These gentlemen fulfilled the duties of their offices so well during our Sophomore year that three of them were to be held over by popular demand to serve as officers in coming years. On this note of suspense, we change the subject for a new, brief paragraph.

Colonel Roy P. Moss, under whose guidance the Army ROTC was organized at Providence College, was honored at a formal military ceremony on the campus. The colonel retired from active duty and Colonel Norman P. Barnett was named as his successor.

We were proud to learn that eight of our classmates had earned positions on Coach Mullaney's basketball squad. These players who had graduated from the ranks of the Freshman team were Skip Karam, Lionel Jenkins, Frank Tirico, Roger Canestrari, Ed Cahill, Rollie Benoit and Gordon Holmes, and, in the game with Brown during Homecoming Weekend, they outshone the veteran members of the team. Of course, it was a member of our class who emerged as the brightest of P.C.'s stars when at the end of the second overtime Gordon Holmes sank the winning basket at a distance of forty-five feet in that historic tussle with Notre Dame. That nebulous commodity known as "school spirit" was very much in evidence after that game as DeMillesque bands of rollicking Friar fans shattered the nocturnal tranquility of Smith Hill. It was a night to remember because of one '58 man who will certainly be remembered at P.C. for years to come.

Our class was also well represented on Coach Dick Rondeau's hockey team and on the cross country team. Cross country finished first in the state and second in New England and it was Billy Hanlon who set the pace for the rest of the team. When P.C. managed a 4 to 3 upset over Clarkson in hockey, ten of our classmates were in the lineup: Rabitor, LaFontaine, Blanchette, Cullen, McMahan, Sainato, Stratton, Carter, Boisvert and Magner. In short,

the Sophomore year demonstrated that our class was one of the best endowed athletically.

The highlight of the social season was held on the weekend of April 28 with a mammoth Sophomore Week-end. Harkins Hall auditorium was transformed into a glittering golden ball-room, by Tony Tatulli and his industrious committee, for Saturday evening's Starlight Serenade. A Jazz Festival had been held off campus the preceding night which was enjoyed by all who could find it.

The scholastic achievements of our class that year were equal to our achievements the previous year. Seven of us were admitted to Alpha Epsilon Delta, the national honor society for pre-meds. The rest of us had to be content with aspiring to make the dean's list because there are no other awards given during the Sophomore year. True to their habits, final examinations crept up on us seemingly unexpectedly, and, after the traditional last minute round of cramming, we wended our way homeward with our confidence somewhat shaken but strong enough to plan on doing better next year.

Our Junior year brought many changes to P.C. More than six hundred beanie-clad Freshmen had been admitted and several new members had been added to the faculty. In recognition of the outstanding work he has done in his years as President of the College, Father Slavin was given an unprecedented extension of indefinite duration as College President. Father Dore was appointed head of the Dominican Community; Father Fennell became Vice President of Administration and Financial Affairs; Father Lennon was appointed Dean of Men. With Father Lennon's appointment, Father Kenny became our class moderator.

During the summer months, St. Joseph and Stephen Halls had been completely renovated and more resembled the Friar-Hilton than the huge barracks they had been when first acquired. The Student Congress must have been employed as overseers in charge of mixing wall-paper paste that summer, for they were too busy to establish any new traditions, and could only revive one which had long been discarded. Henceforth, the walk from Donnelly Drive to the front of Harkins Hall was closed to Freshmen.

When elections for class officers were held, Msrs. Hagan, Doyle and Roche were re-elected for another term. The only newcomer that year was Pete O'Hara, who was destined to be re-elected the following year along with two of his colleagues. The class also elected George Desormeaux and Charlie Dugan as co-chairmen of the ring committee. After months of meetings with sales representatives of the various manufacturers, one of the most attractive rings the school has ever known was selected.

Several events on campus made news that year. The one event which affected all of us was the administration's announcement of a \$50 rise in tuition rates, which caused many of us to curtail our extravagance in doing our Christmas shopping. Louis Budenz, formerly of the *Daily Worker*, who had returned to the Church after abjuring communism, offered a series of lectures in the Extension School on Communist tactics. The Veterans' Club sponsored a tag day to establish a fund for the maintenance of the Grotto. The Cowl was put into the capable hands of Jim Heap and Paul Grady. The Friday night stag dances were suspended and then later reinstated when it was certain that they could be better managed.

The sporting news of the season was off to a bright start as Bill Hanlon once again led the cross country team in

taking the state championship. The basketball team, with a nucleus formed by Junior Donahue, Titico, Jenkins, Canestrari, and Holmes, rounded out their season with a 15-9 record. The hockey team, also well-endowed with members of our class, began the season by defeating the team ranked first in the East—Harvard—by a score of two to one. They continued their home season undefeated and our classmate Lou LaFontaine earned a place on the second All-East team.

The social season culminated in the most outstanding Junior Prom P.C. has seen in years. As in preceding years, our major social activity was placed in the hands of Tony Tatulli, and, with the assistance of Ed McFadden and the members of the Prom committee, he once again did a splendid job of making our evening successful. The two hundred couples who attended the dance will not soon forget that wonderful evening at Rhodes', dancing to the unparalleled music of the fabled Glenn Miller Orchestra.

May brought final exams, as usual, the harbinger of Summer. Most of us went our own way during the vacation, but a few lucky souls were treated to an all-expenses-paid stay at the Summer resort which the government maintains at beautiful Fort Devens. Seventy members of our class attended ROTC Summer Camp there, and were treated to the exhilarating experience of sitting in bleachers several times a day from five in the morning until midnight to hear brilliant lectures which inevitably began: "You, gentlemen, are potential officers in the United States Army and, as such, must know . . ." There seemed to be so much that potential officers should know, that one wondered how he would ever get through six weeks of camp. The P.C. contingent not only finished the six week course without casualties, but won recognition as the most outstanding delegation in the entire camp. During the first week, George Riley was named "outstanding cadet of the week," and two weeks later, Dave Harrington was given the same distinction. At the end of six weeks' work, one loquacious, cliché-addicted member of our class remarked, "I wouldn't do it again for a million dollars, but I wouldn't have missed it for the world!" The sentiment is understandable, but the gentleman seems to be pricing himself out of the field.

In the Fall, we returned to the campus as Seniors. Father Slavin welcomed us back and told us that we represented only sixty percent of our original class. A series of changes in the Administration were announced: Father Dore had been appointed to the new post of Dean of Faculty; Father Lennon was now Dean of the College; Father Jurgelaitis had been appointed Dean of Discipline; Father Jordan became Dean of Men. Succeeding the late Father Clark as Director of the School of Adult Education was Father Danilowicz.

Perhaps the most noticeable and significant change made when we entered was to be seen in the fact that with a member of our class, Joe Dolan, at the head of the Student Congress, a new note of sense and sensibility guided the deliberations of that august body. It took '58 to set them straight, and we have been free from the terrors of newly established traditions. Legislation was once again considered a means rather than an end in itself, and for that reason there were no outraged attacks on the Student Congress during our Senior year.

Senior class elections were held early in the year and Jim Hagan was elected president of the class. This is not a typographical error. Mr. Hagan served us as president for three successive years. Pete O'Hara and Dave Roche were also re-elected, with D. J. Dooley making an appearance as secretary. Jim Westwater was given the position of liaison officer between the Alumni and our class, probably because he never seemed to have enough to do.

All manner of honors were bestowed upon worthy members of our class. Father Kenny, moderator of the class, inflicted the Editorship of the 1958 VERITAS upon Robert E. Laffey (pseudonym used by Thomas Stearns Eliot when he visits Madagascar incognito). Dave Harrington was named Cadet Colonel of the Providence College ROTC Regiment. Battalion Commanders under Harrington were Lieutenant Colonels John Houle, Donald Grenier, and David Roche. The Captains of the various sports teams, as elected by their team mates, were Lou LaFontaine, hockey; Dave Harrington, rifle team; Ed Donahue, basketball; Bill Hanlon, track; Herb Nicholas and Ed Lewis, baseball. *Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities* listed 29 Seniors from P.C. Thirty-eight Seniors were admitted as members of the Theta Chapter, Delta Epsilon Sigma.

The first social event of the year was the Farmers Festival. As has been their habit since entering P.C., the class of '58 decided to enliven this traditional event as much as possible. Thus, the annual hoedown was converted to a calypso hoedown and 120 couples were treated to "something new and different from the Isle of Haiti"—calypso music, country style.

The winter sports season rolled around again and both teams got off to fast starts. The hockey team, undefeated in their first three games, provided the most excitement with an upset victory over Rensselaer. The Engineers were highly ranked, but the Friars proved to be too much for them in a game that was termed "unbelievable" by everyone who saw it. The basketball team likewise won their first three games, including victories over Brown and U.R.I. During the Christmas holiday they scored an amazing triumph in being the first college team to defeat the Quantico Marines in the history of the annual Quantico Marine Tournament. As this history was being written in January, their record was an impressive 13-2 and it seems possible that they will finish the season without another loss.

Here we have reached the midway point in our Senior year, but because of that old nemesis of writers, the deadline, the authors must here take their leave.

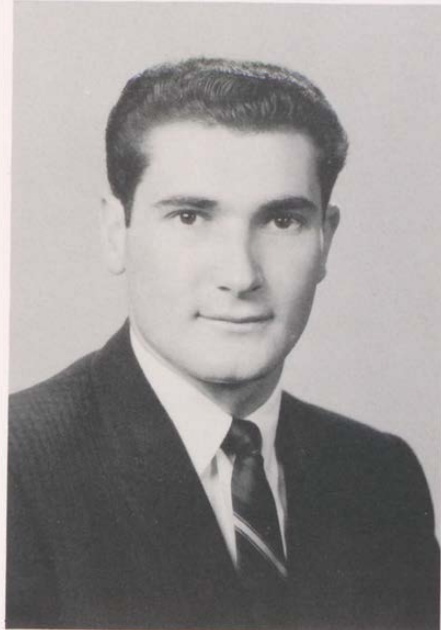

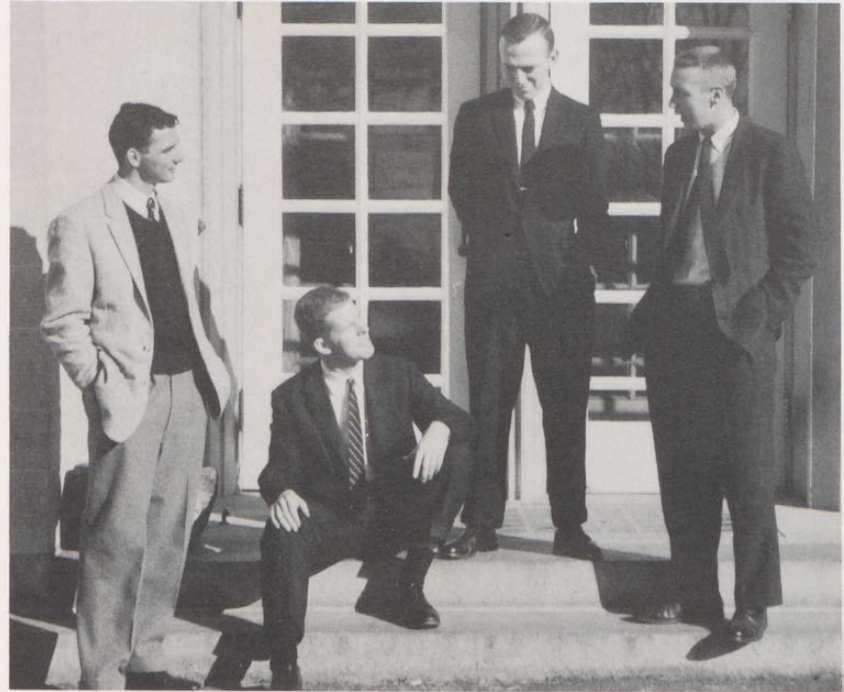


SOPHOMORES

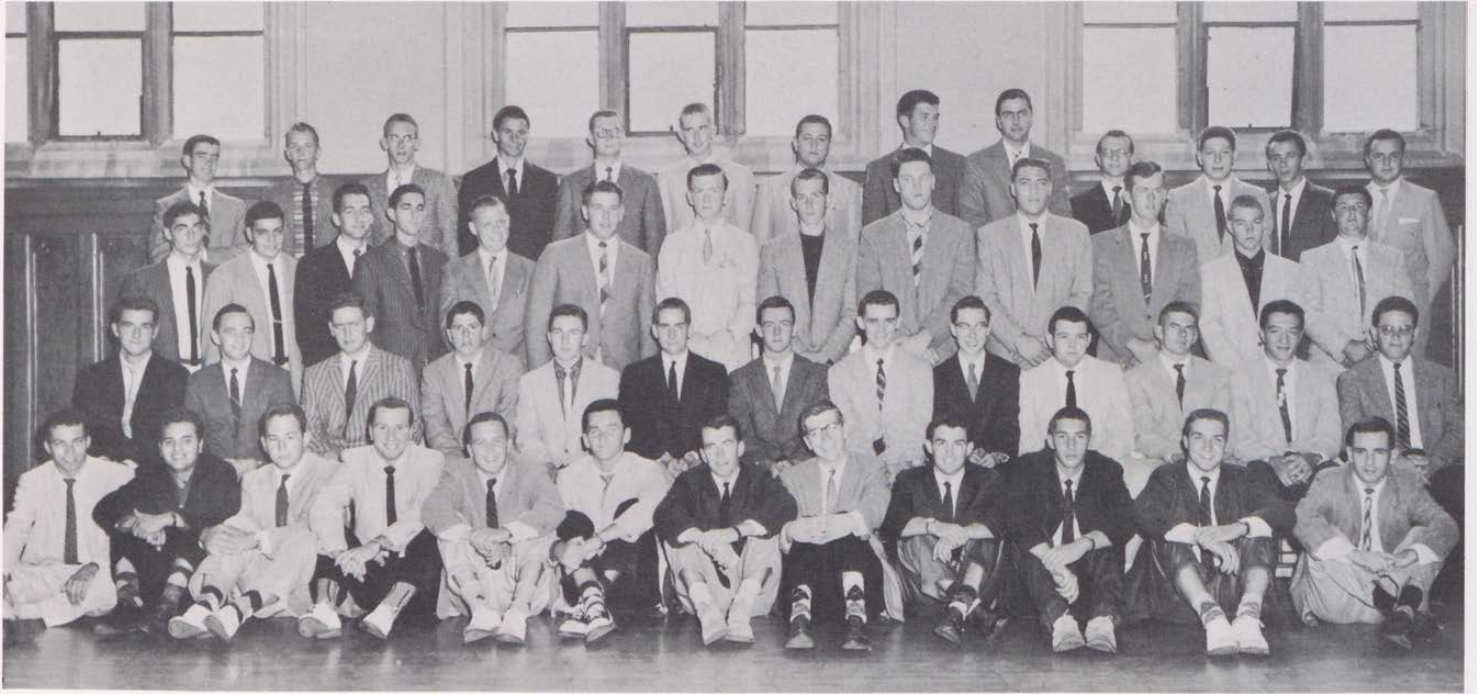

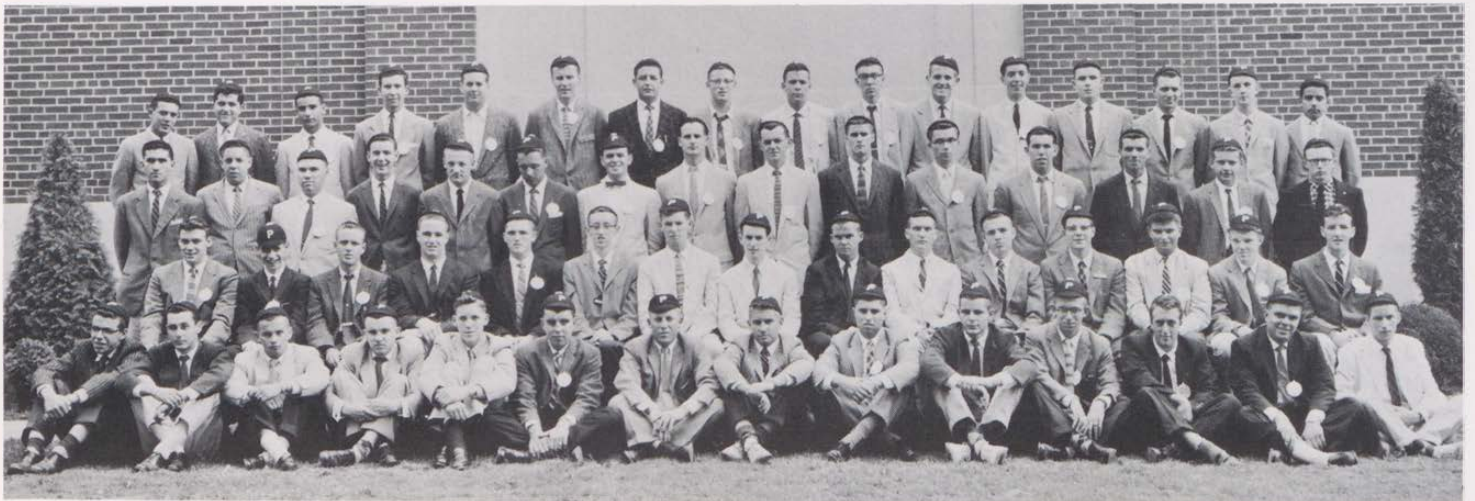

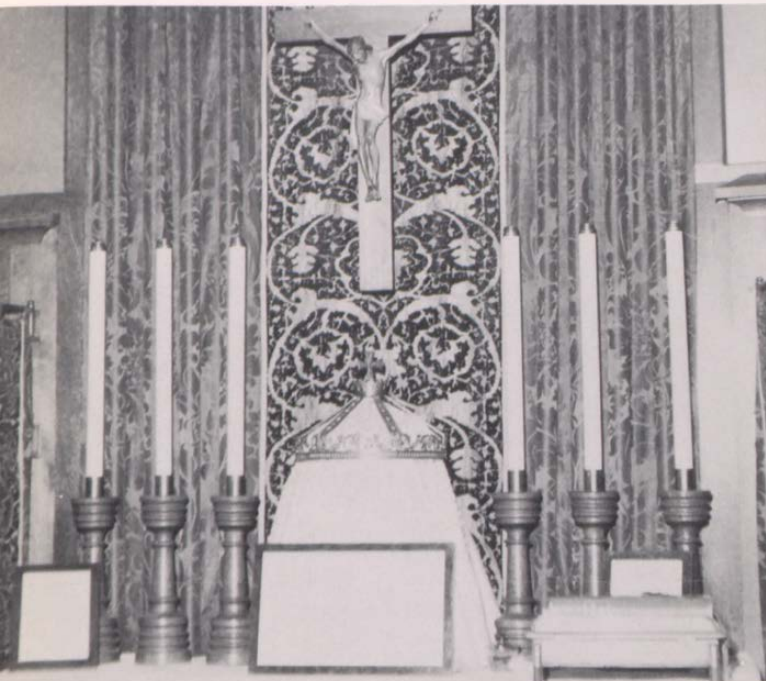

Daily Mass is available to students in the residence halls, as well as in Harkins Hall. Night prayers and First Friday devotions are popular as is testified by the large attendance.

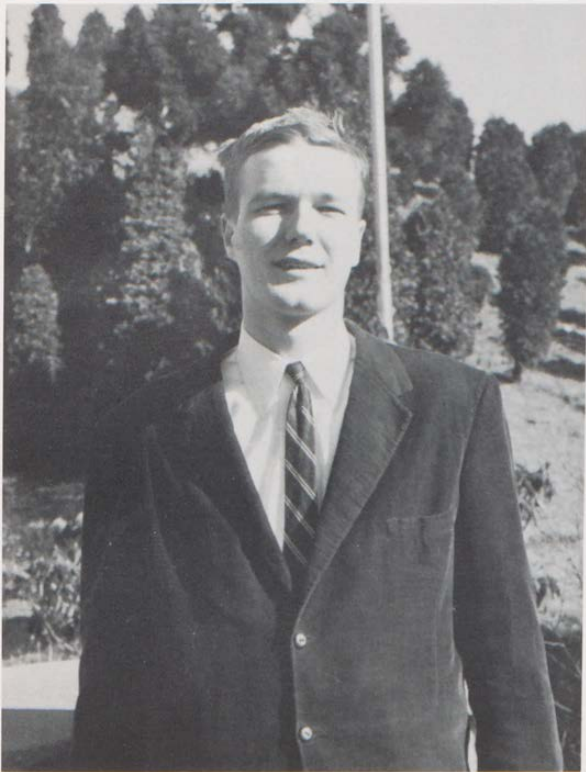

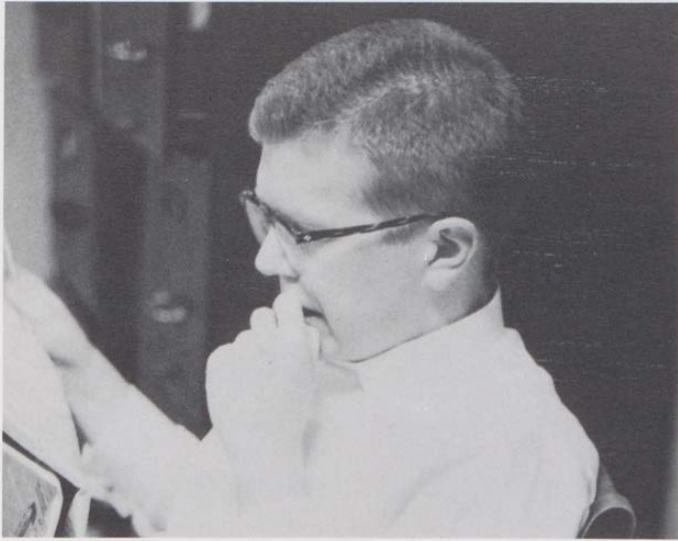

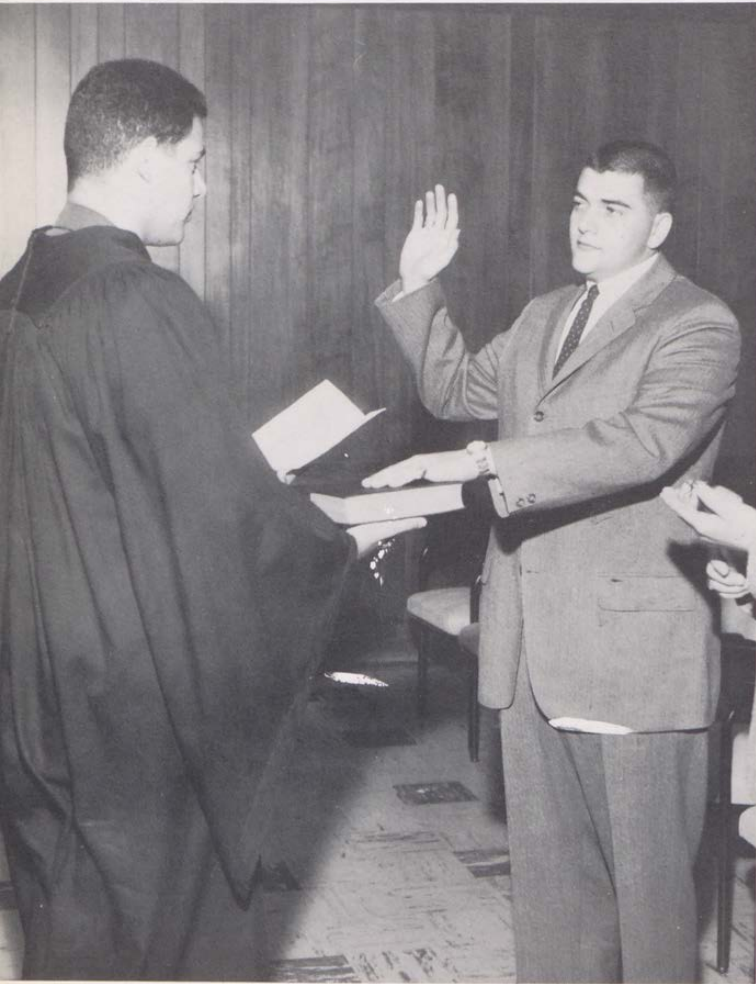

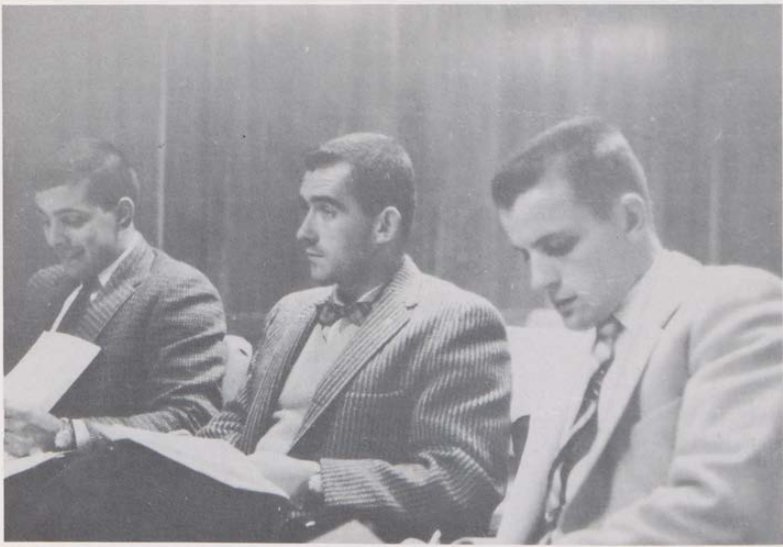

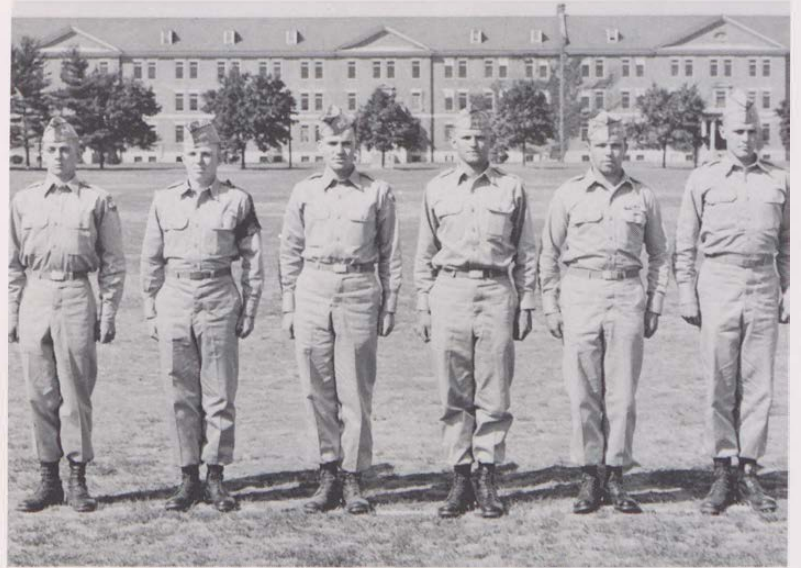
Summer Camp provides for the ROTC Cadet a chance to put into practice the theories he has learned in the classroom and on the drill field.

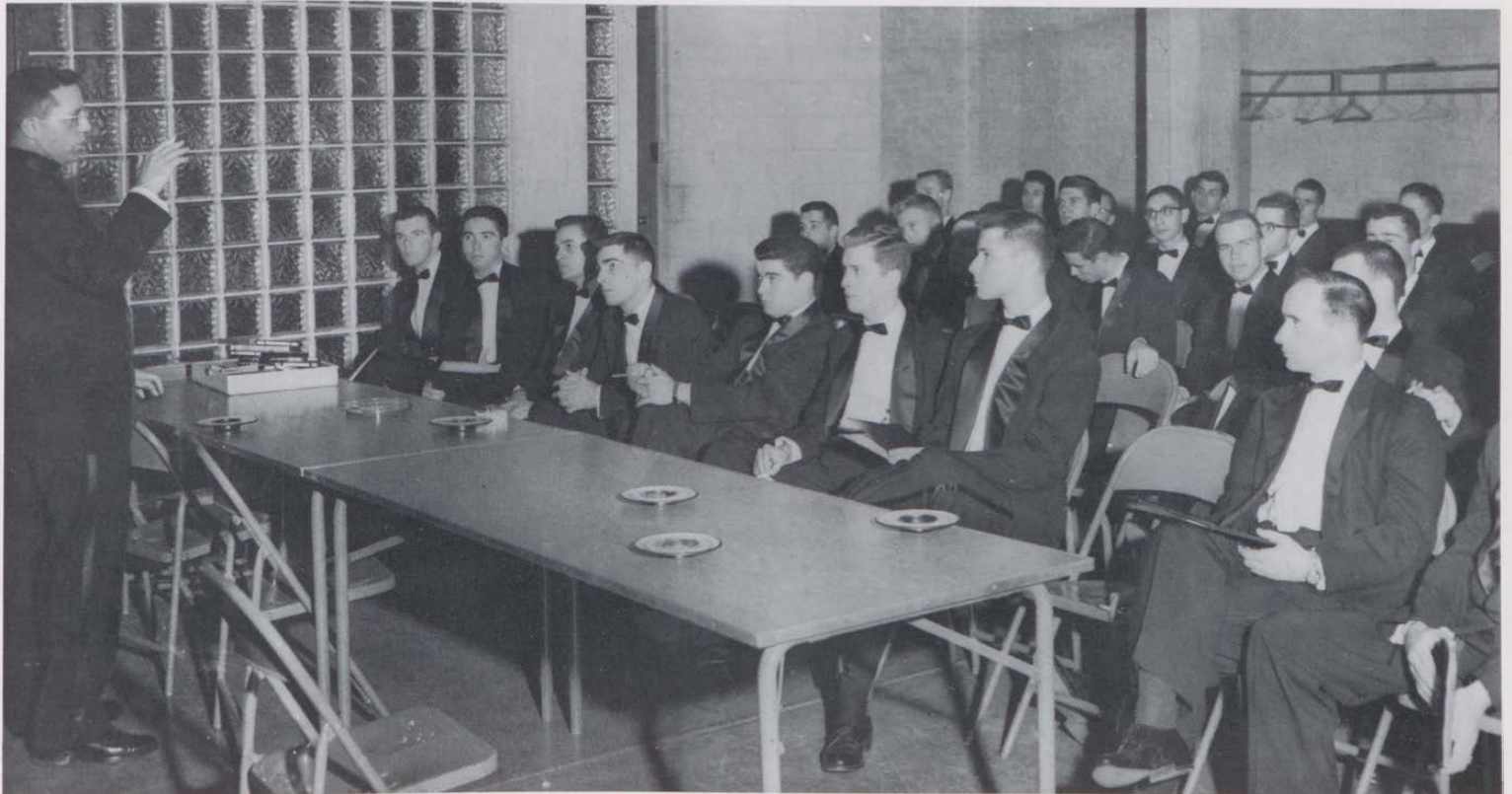

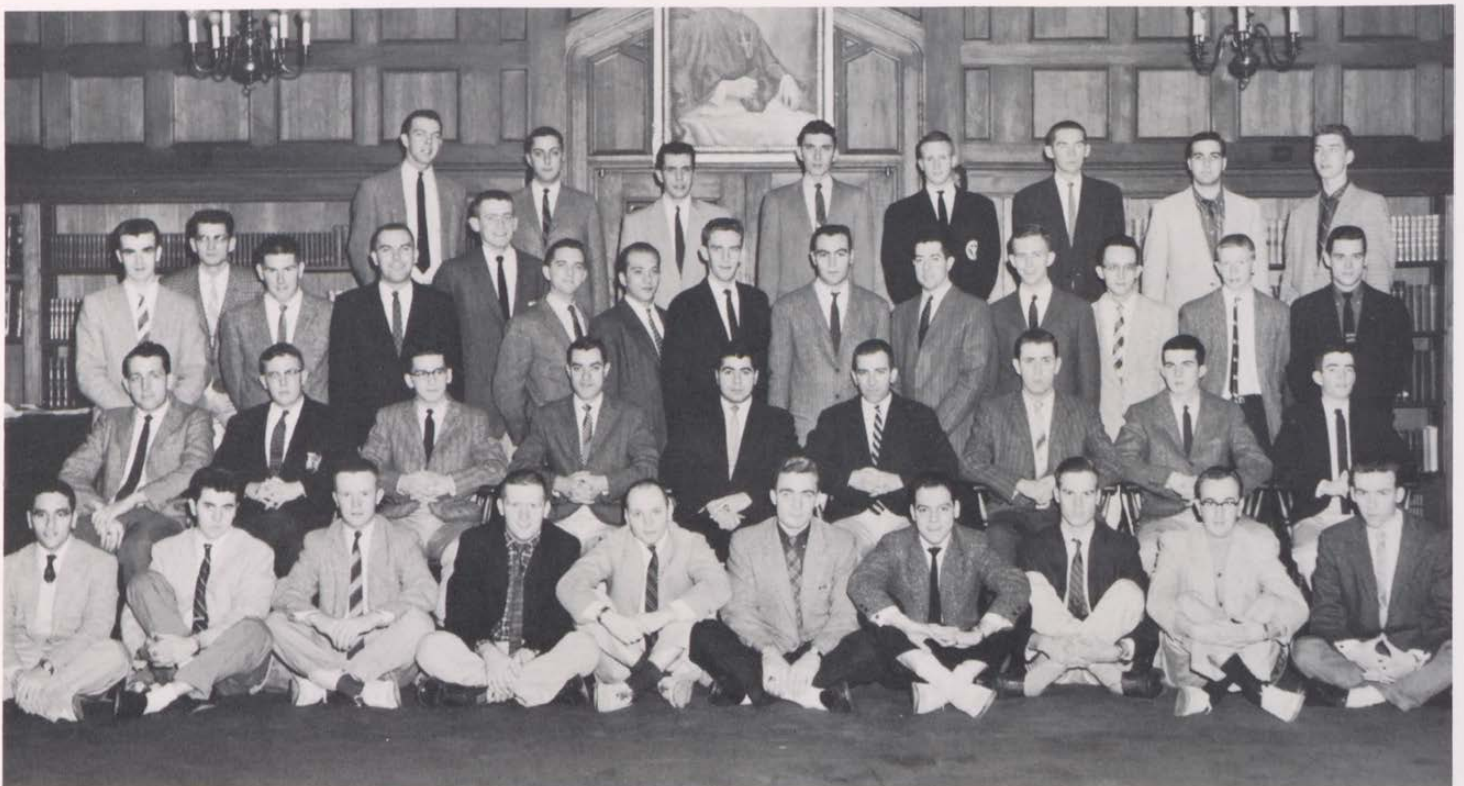

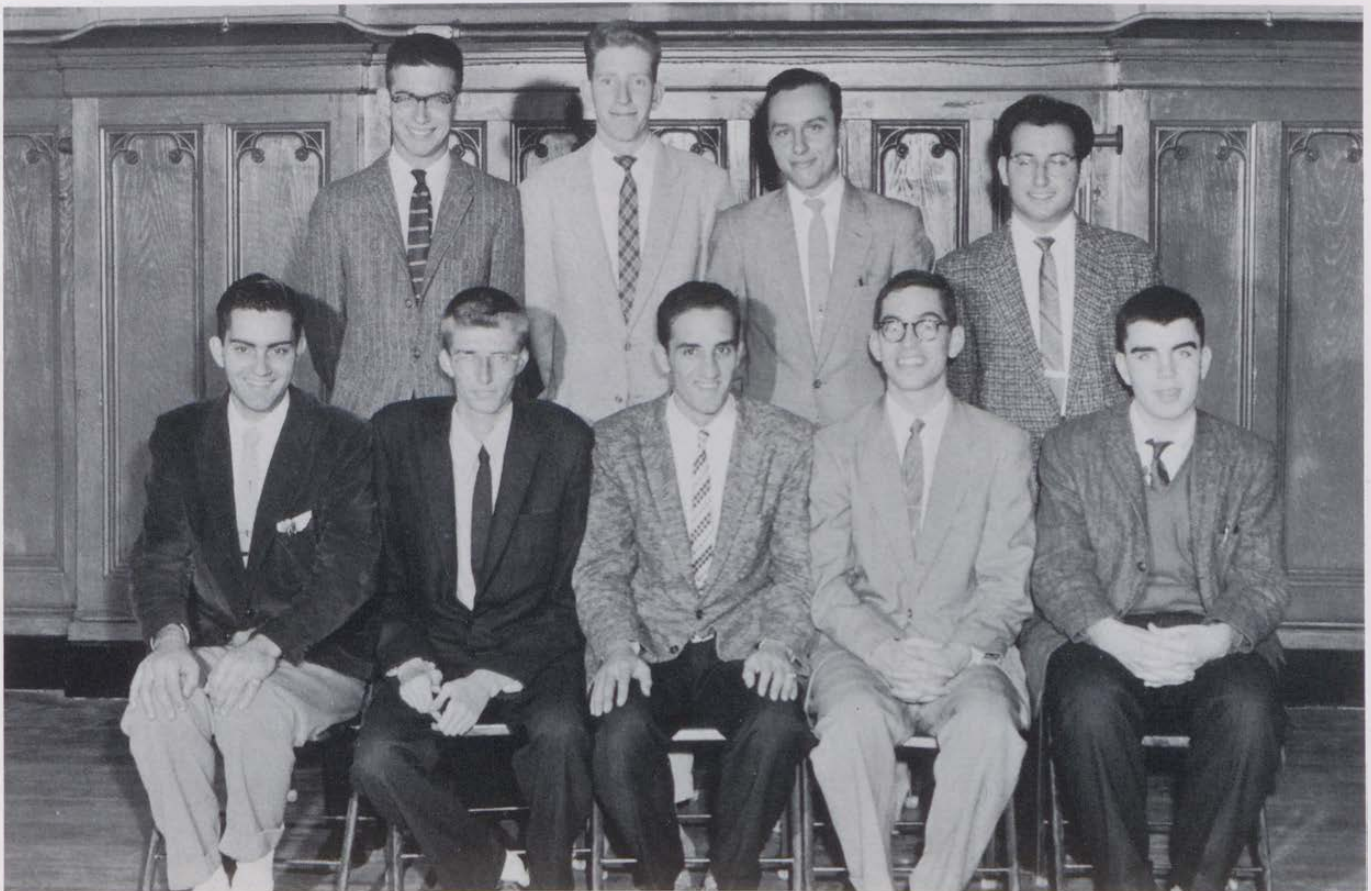

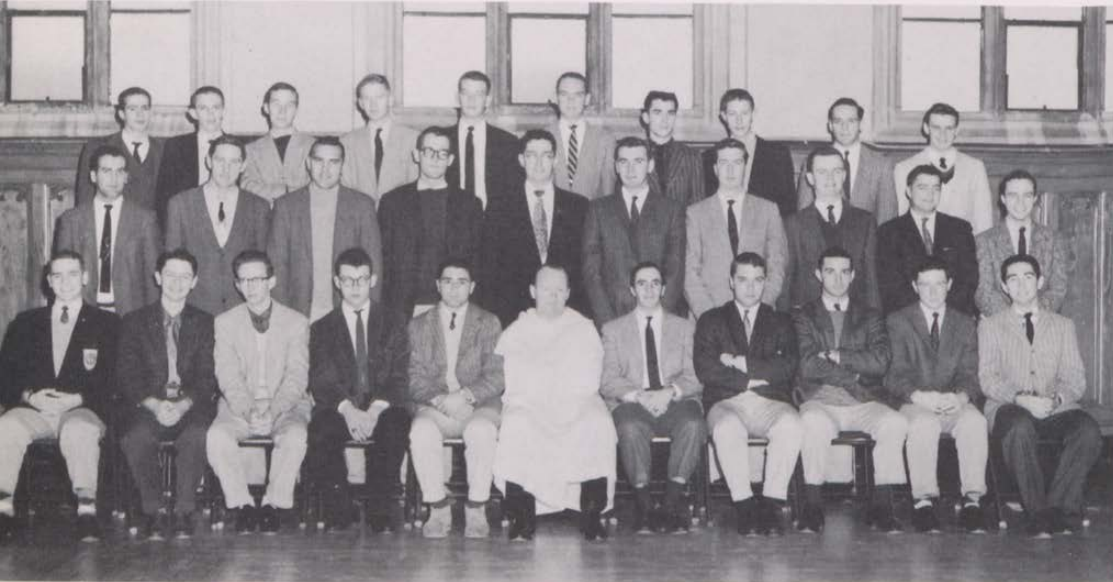

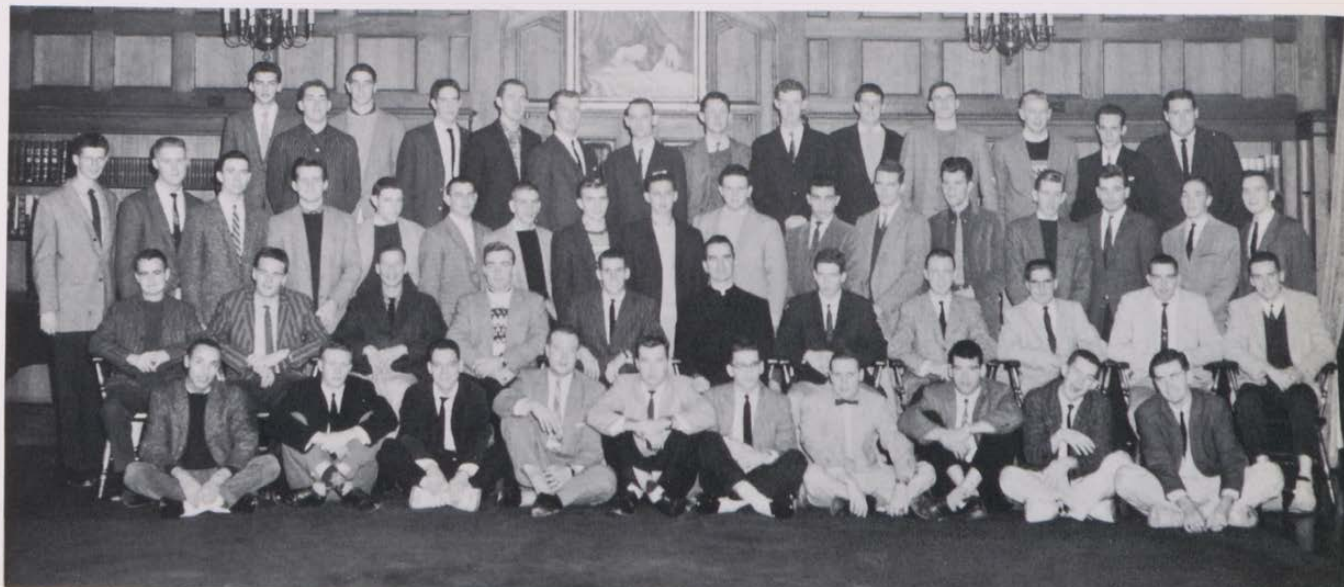

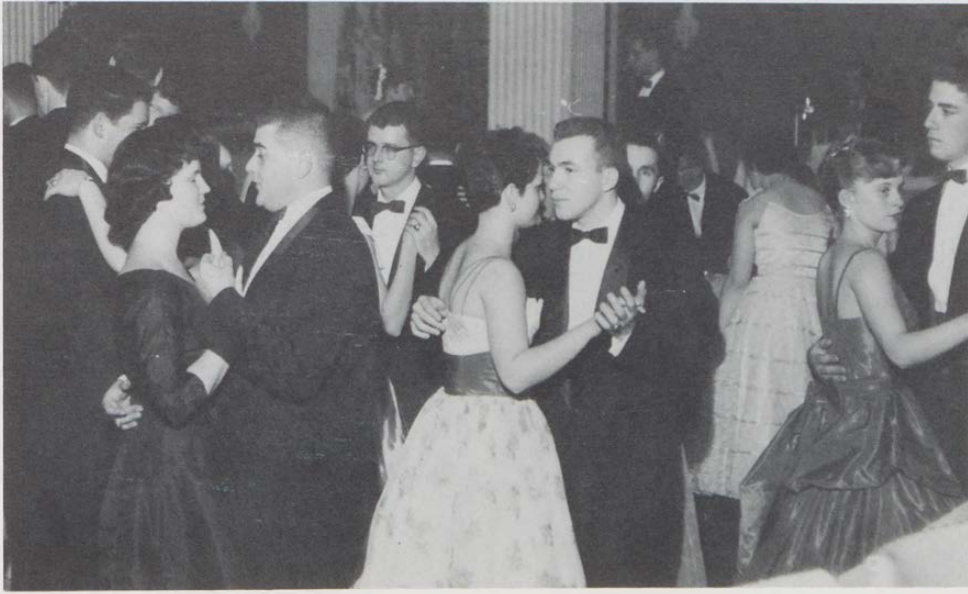

On April 16, 1957, Coach Bob Murray, in his sophomore season as Providence College diamond mentor, brought his veteran-studded Friar baseball team to Chestnut Hill to duel Boston College in the season opener of a 19 game schedule, which would find the Black and White engaging some of the top college nines in New England. A combination of wildness and loose defensive play on the part of the Friars enabled the Eagles to register seven runs in the first inning on their way to a 9-6 triumph. P. C. chipped away at the Boston margin, but the lead proved to be insurmountable despite the efforts of Larry Cummings, who struck out twelve in relief and led his team at bat with three hits.

Following their opening game defeat, the Friars journeyed South to Quantico, Virginia for a three game set with the Marines, who were composed mainly of ex-college ballplayers. The Leathernecks showed themselves inhospitable hosts by defeating their visitors in all three contests.

In the opener, a 9th inning P. C. rally, highlighted by Red Rabitor's three-run homer, fell one run short as Quantico copped the verdict, 6-5. The second game, halted in the bottom of the fifth by rain, went to the Marines 6-3. Timely singles by Herbie Nicholas and Mike McDonough provided the Friars with their three markers. Quantico engineered a clean sweep despite

five-hit hurling by the Friar twirlers and a 340 ft. home run by Eddie Lewis.

P. C. encountered Upsala on its return trek and came away on the short end of a 4-1 score. Bob Ritacco and Bud Slattery pitched well for the Friars, but were the victims of stingy three-hit hurling by the Orangemen.

Yale dealt the Murraymen their sixth consecutive setback with a 5-2 win at New Haven. The Elis, capitalizing on three bases on balls and a triple steal, countered three times in the first frame to pave the way for victory. Frank Tirico's double and Rabitor's single sparked a brief last inning Friar uprising.

On April 30, P. C. returned to the friendly confines of Hendricken Field and gained its initial triumph of the campaign at the expense of A.I.C., 7-4. Ritacco spinned a neat five-hitter while striking out eight. Jack Healy with three hits and Jim Riordan with a home run paced the Friars at the plate.

The Black and White's success was short-lived, however, as U.R.I.'s Ray Peltier whitewashed the Friars, 7-0, on four hits in the opener of the state series at Kingston. Sophomore Bob Plante sparked for P. C. by blanking the Rams on two hits for five innings in a game marred by gale-force winds.

Despite 15 hits, including 4 for 4 by Dan Mulvey, the Friar contingent absorbed their eighth setback of the season, 8-7, at the hands of Boston University at Braves Field. The Terriers' winning run was the result of a bases loaded walk in the bottom of the 7th inning. The defeat had some solace, however, as the Friars hitters snapped their batting lethargy to stage their biggest offensive splurge of the still young season.

U.R.I.'s Rams captured their 2nd decision from the Friars by handing the home forces a 6-3 loss in a hard fought ten inning struggle at Hendricken Field. The teams battled on even terms for the first nine innings, but damaging miscues and a booming triple in the first extra frame nullified a brilliant mound effort by Bob Ritacco, author of 11 strikeouts. Herbie Nicholas homered for the Black and White.

In the top individual batting performance of the year, the hustling Friar shortstop had a perfect 6 for 6 day at the plate, including a triple, double, four runs scored, and five R.B.I.'s. Every member of the Friar cast hit safely except pitcher Bob Plante who stifled the Greyhounds on two hits. Plante's performance was the more remarkable when viewed from the light that the two hits were garnered by the Greyhound's first two batters, after which he shut the door.

N.C.A.A.-bound Springfield, on the strength of a 7th inning grand-slam homer by Ed Bilik, conquered the Friars, 9-4, in a May 9 contest at Hendricken Field. Providence enjoyed a 2-0 lead until the

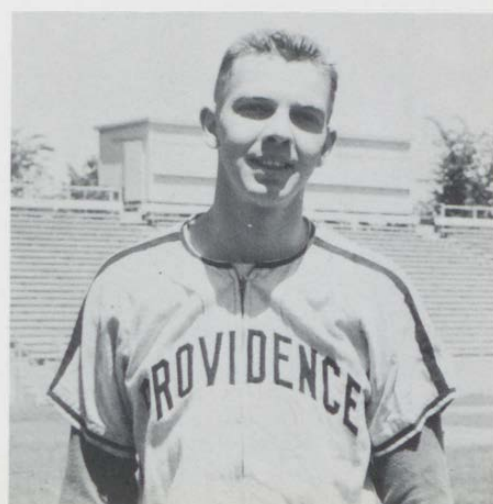

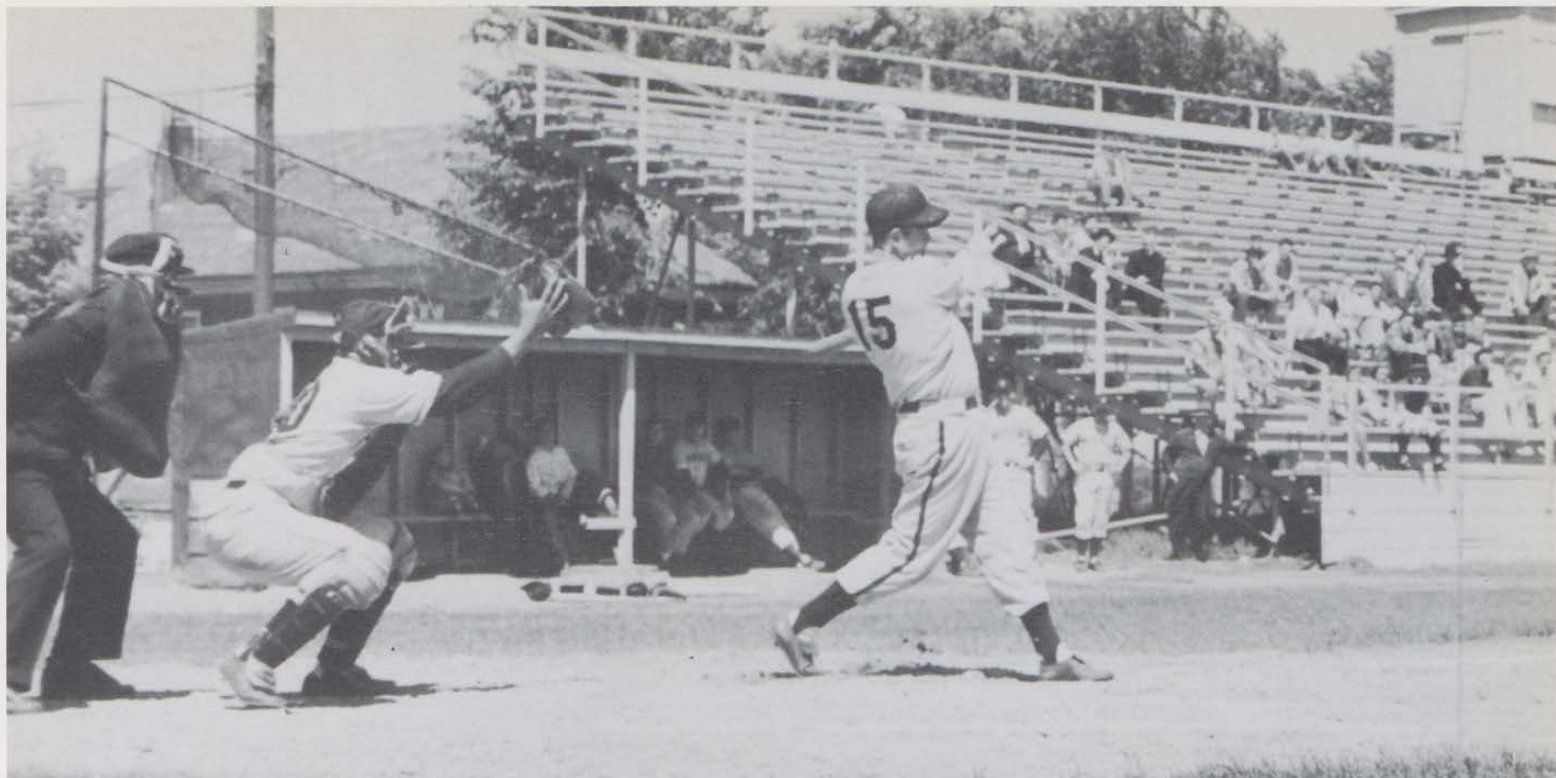
championship. The lone P.C. safety was a 7th inning triple by Eddie Lewis, which succeeded in bringing home Herbie Nicholas who had walked.

The curtain rang down on the 1957 season with a measure of satisfaction for four departing seniors, Captain Tom Ca-

hill, Jack Healy, Mike McDonough, and Bob Gulla, made their last effort for P.C. a successful one, as the Friars outscored Boston College 5-2. Star hurler Bob Ritacco limited the Eagles to only four hits while whiffing eleven. Nicholas, Lewis, and Healy triggered the P.C. attack.

Although the team's record was a poor one, its performances toward the end of the season gave signs of future hope. Capturing 3 of its last 4 games is especially satisfying in view of the fact that the nucleus of the club will return next year.

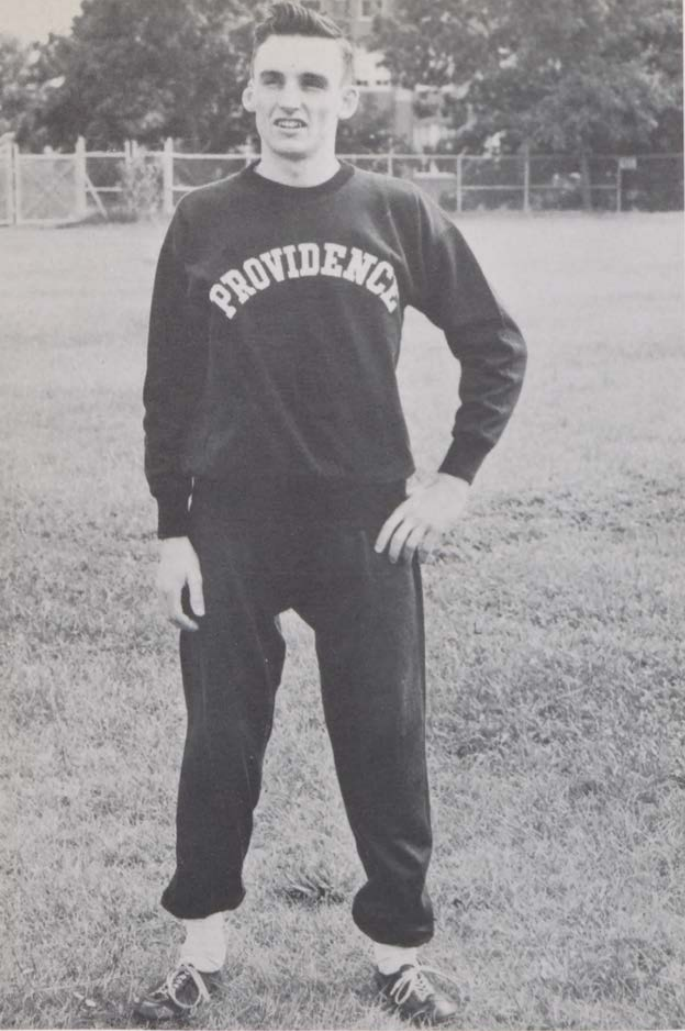
and Bill Horridge captured sixth, seventh and ninth in a frustrating loss for the harriers.

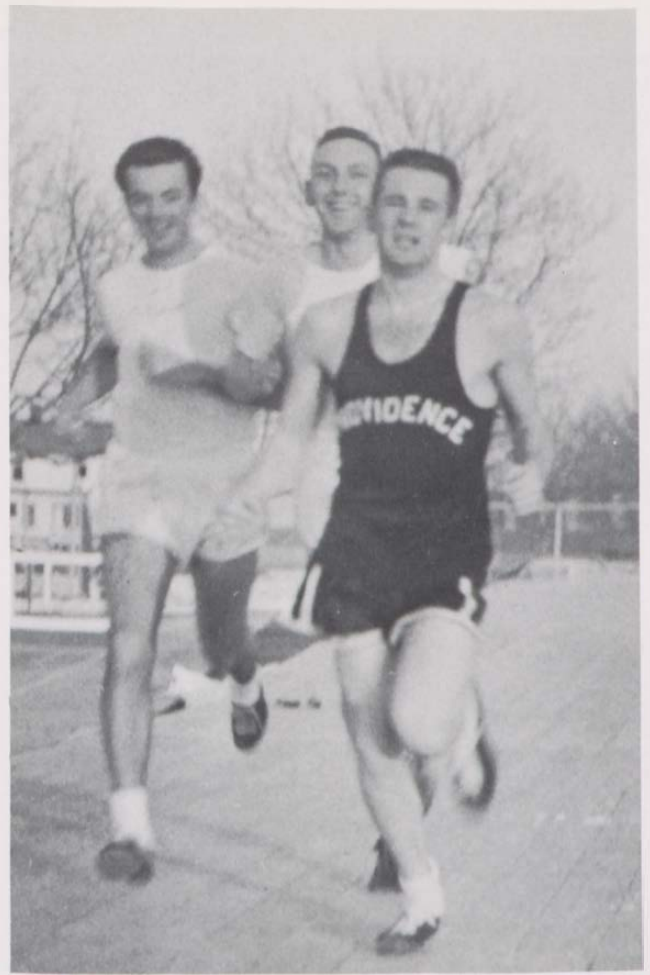

the first Friar home, finished fourth. Bill Horridge, Bob Williams, Dennis Carey, Bob Ruggeri completed the scoring for P.C.

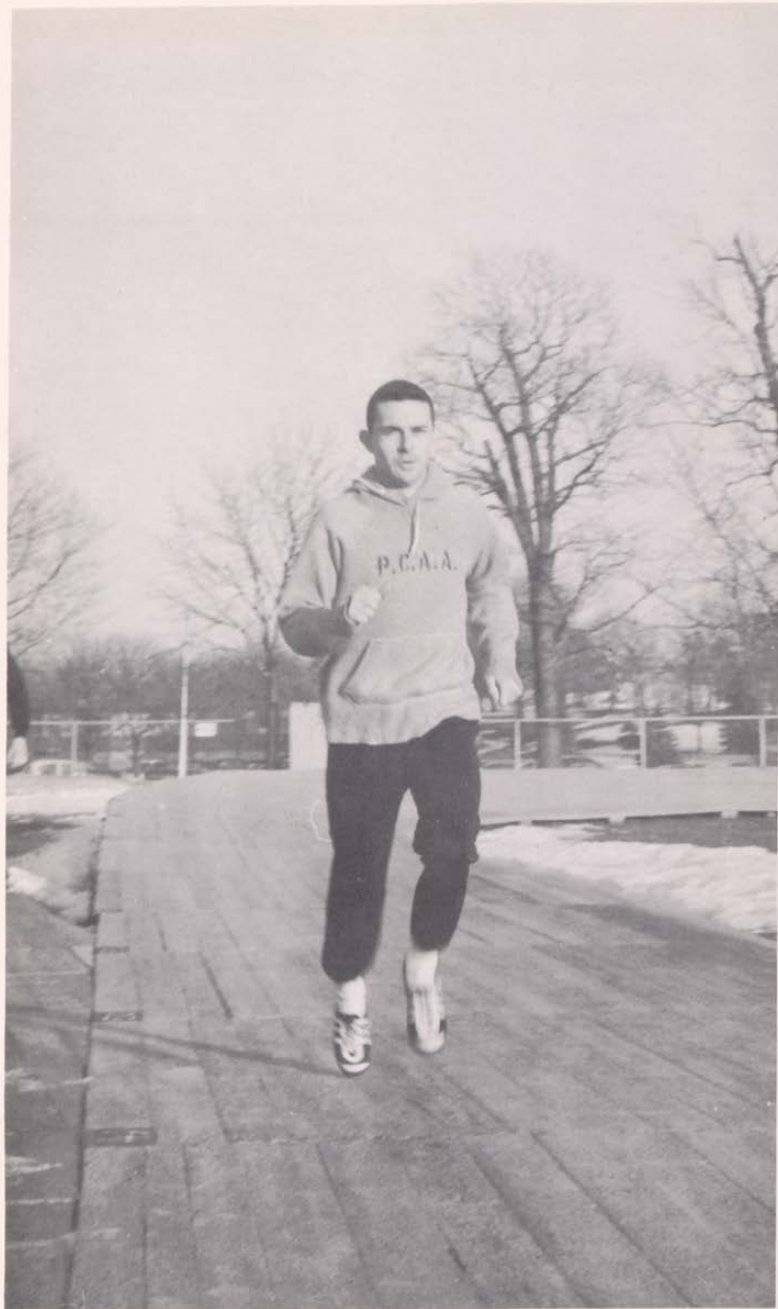

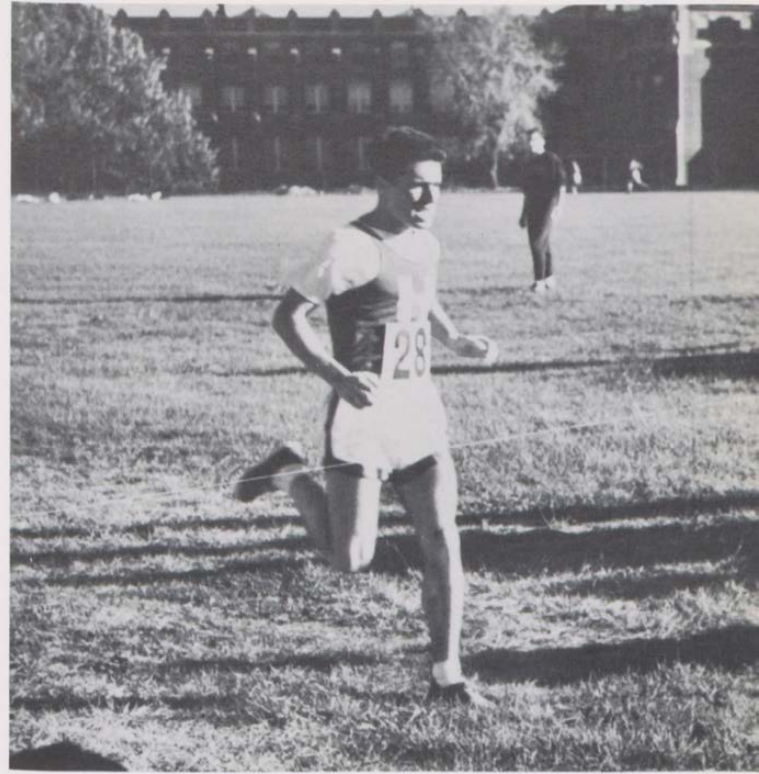
The Brown frosh also took their race

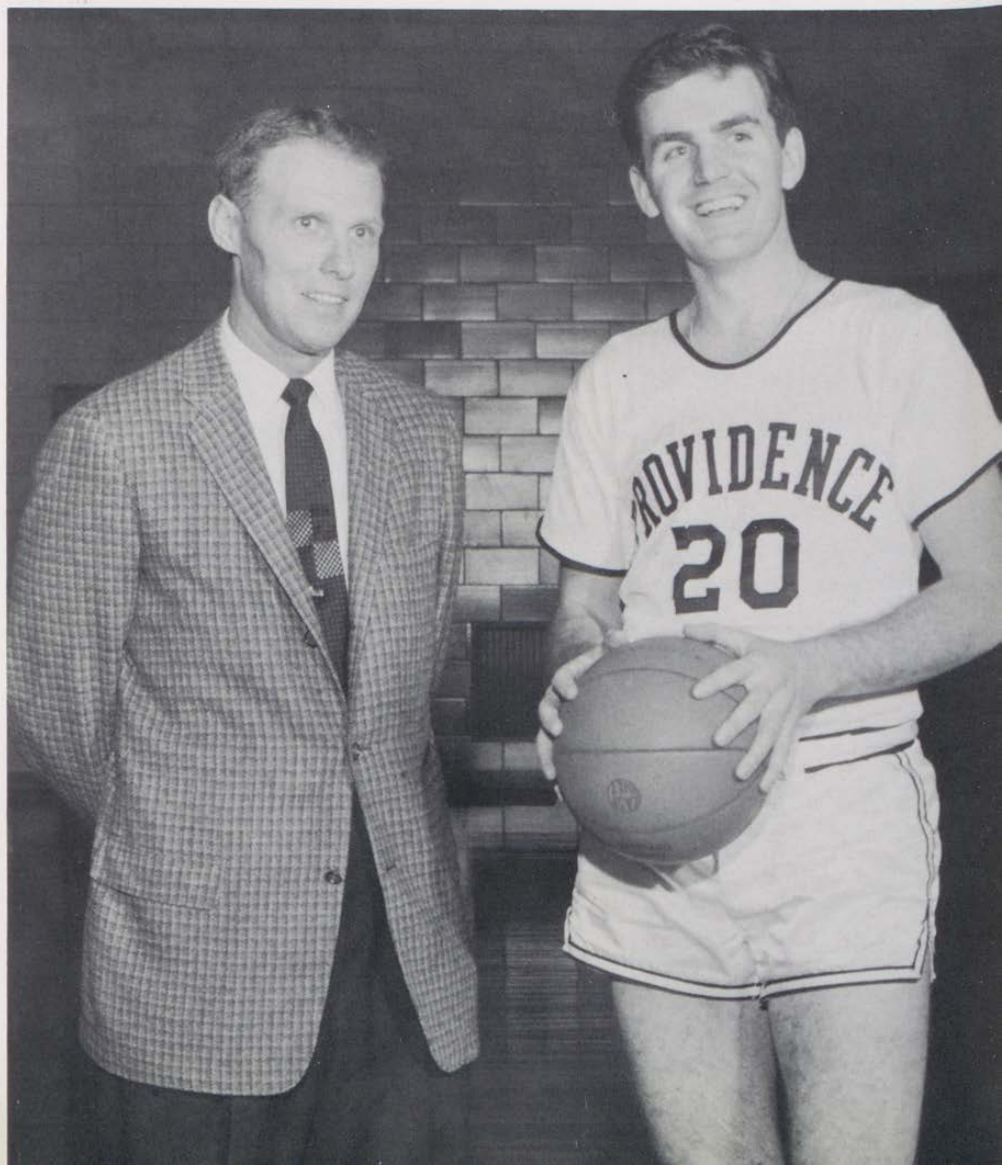

Sunday, December 1, 1957 inaugurated the 1957-58 basketball season at Providence College, as the talent-laden Friars, led by their captain, Ed Donohue and featuring four Seniors, five Juniors, and four Sophomores, took the floor to do battle with Fairfield University. The big question on most people's minds — could the three Sophomores in the starting lineup, members of last year's undefeated Freshman five, meet the challenge of varsity competition — was answered almost immediately as they proceeded to score the first three baskets of the game, spearheading an offense which rolled on to an 83-60 win. Lenny Wilkens with 18 and Wally DiMasi with 17 gave strong indication that they planned to continue the winning habit they acquired as freshmen.

The Friars chalked up their second victory in as many starts by downing the University of Rhode Island to the tune of 55-45. The Black and White were pressed most of the way although they were never behind. Again it was the three Sophs who paced the scoring attack. Len Wilkens and Walt DiMasi both tallied 14 points, while John Woods was good for 10.

Two wins had not made the Friar five any less apprehensive of Stan Ward's Brown team. The Bruins had height and some experience on their side, but that

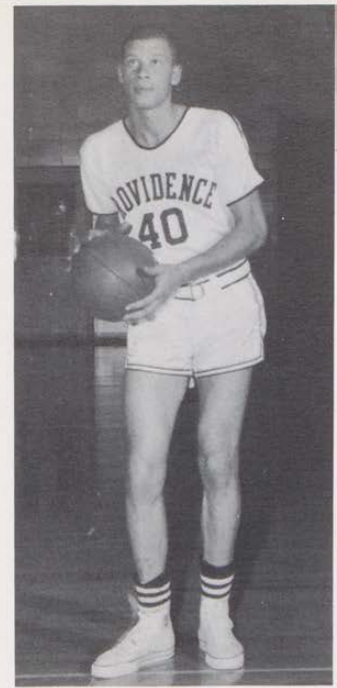

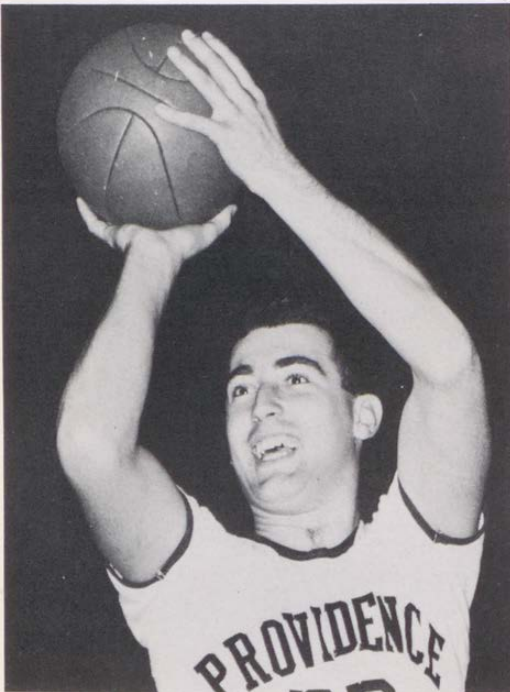
The first dreary note of the campaign struck on December 9 when Brandeis

Kross, making his first start of the season, scored 21 points and rebounded well. Providence, normally a second half club, enjoyed a fine first half and led 32-22 at intermission. AIC roared back to tie the score in the second half, but the alert play of Jim Swartz, together with a yeoman job on the boards by Len Wil-

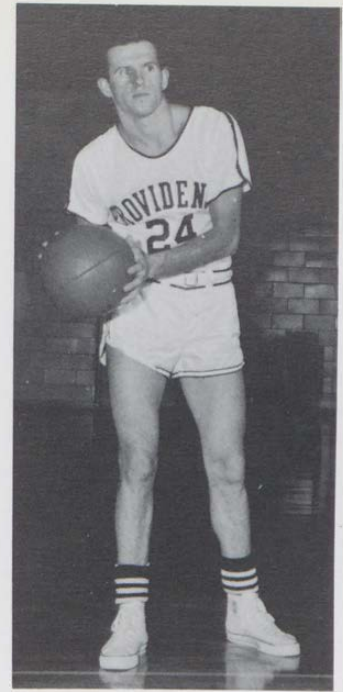




Control man: Frank Tirico, senior New Yorker, practices ball possession.

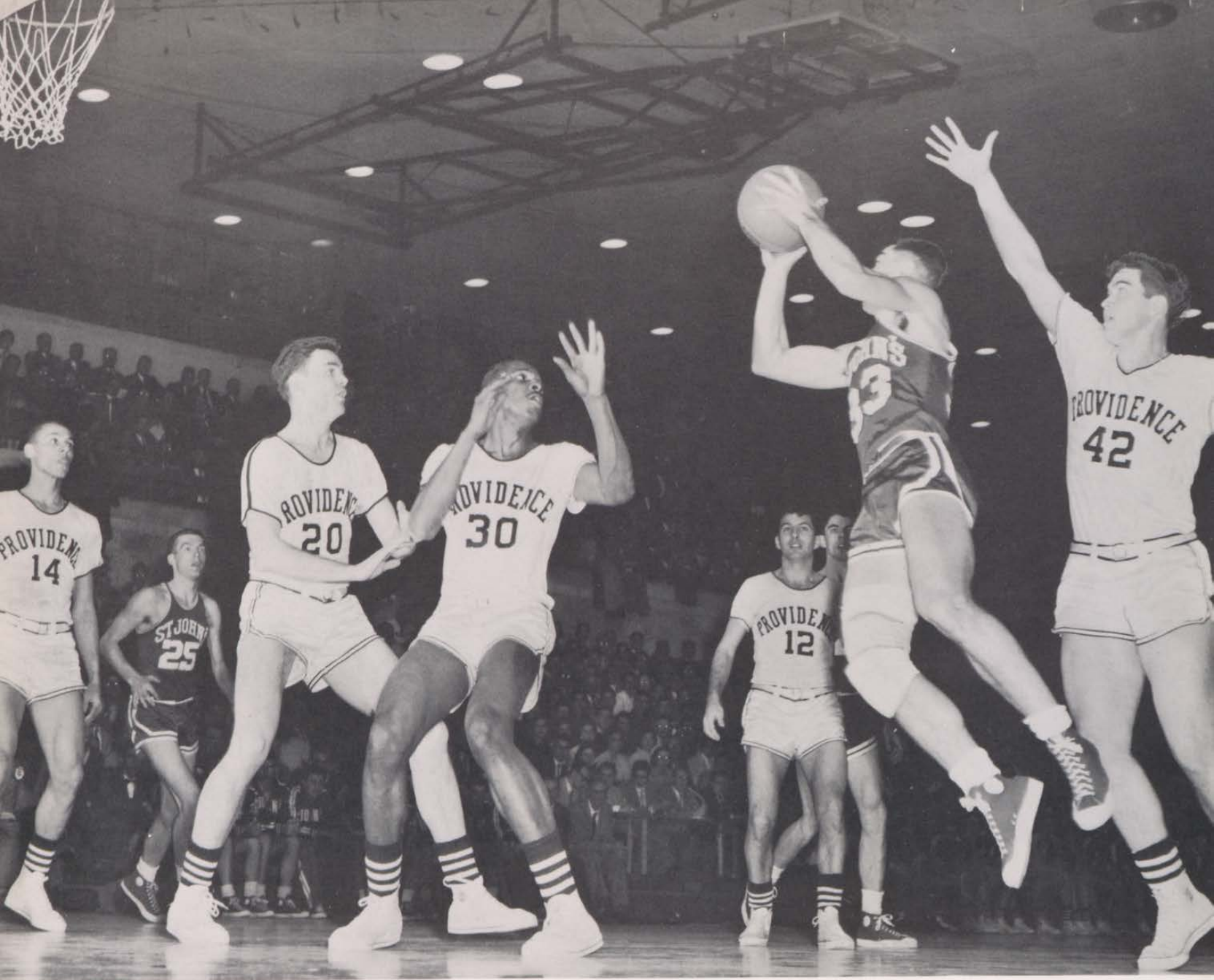

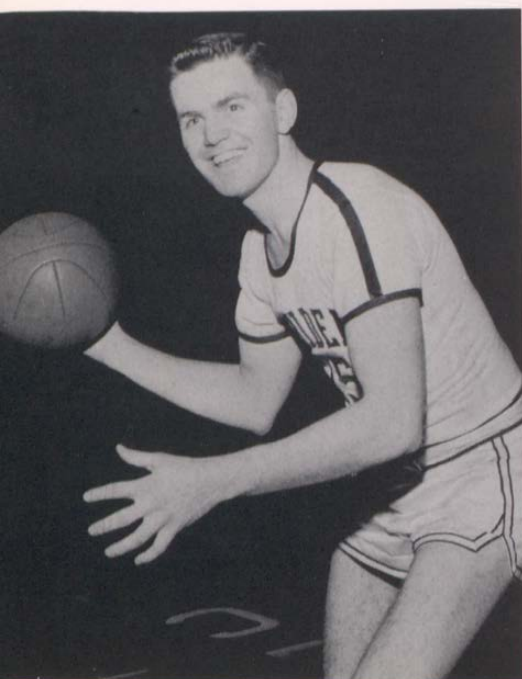


sion time. In the second half St. Francis came within 4 points, but the Friars continued their fine performance and went on to one of the season's best wins.

With the beginning of the Christmas vacation, the Black and White journeyed south to participate in the Quantico Invitational Tournament. Their first round opponent was Hartwick College of upstate New York, which succumbed to the fab-

In the semi-final the Friars toppled St. Michael's of Vermont, 65-53. This game followed the script of the opener. The top offensive star for Providence continued to be the "Hempstead Hustler," Jimmy Swartz. Jim was good for 19 points, giving him 46 in two games. Pete Schmenti and Frank Tirico came off the bench to greatly aid our attack. Johnny Woods mastered the backboard and gathered 16 rebounds.

The Friars and the Quantico Marines reached the finals of the tournament. The

Marines featured many outstanding former college players, among them last year's P.C. Captain, John Ritch. It seemed as if our boys were overmatched. During the first half, there was a battle for every basket and the score was tied 9 times. At half-time the Friars led 27-26. The rest of the game was close, but P.C. never again lost the lead and emerged a 63-56 victor. In addition to winning the trophy the Friars were honored by the unanimous election of Jimmy Swartz as the Most Valuable Player of the Tournament.

The advent of the new year witnessed the return of the city and state basketball crown to Providence College. Behind a well-balanced offense that saw four of our men net double figures, we continued our supremacy over intrastate rivals by trampling Brown 80-52. A spurt of fourteen straight points, after the Bruins had tallied

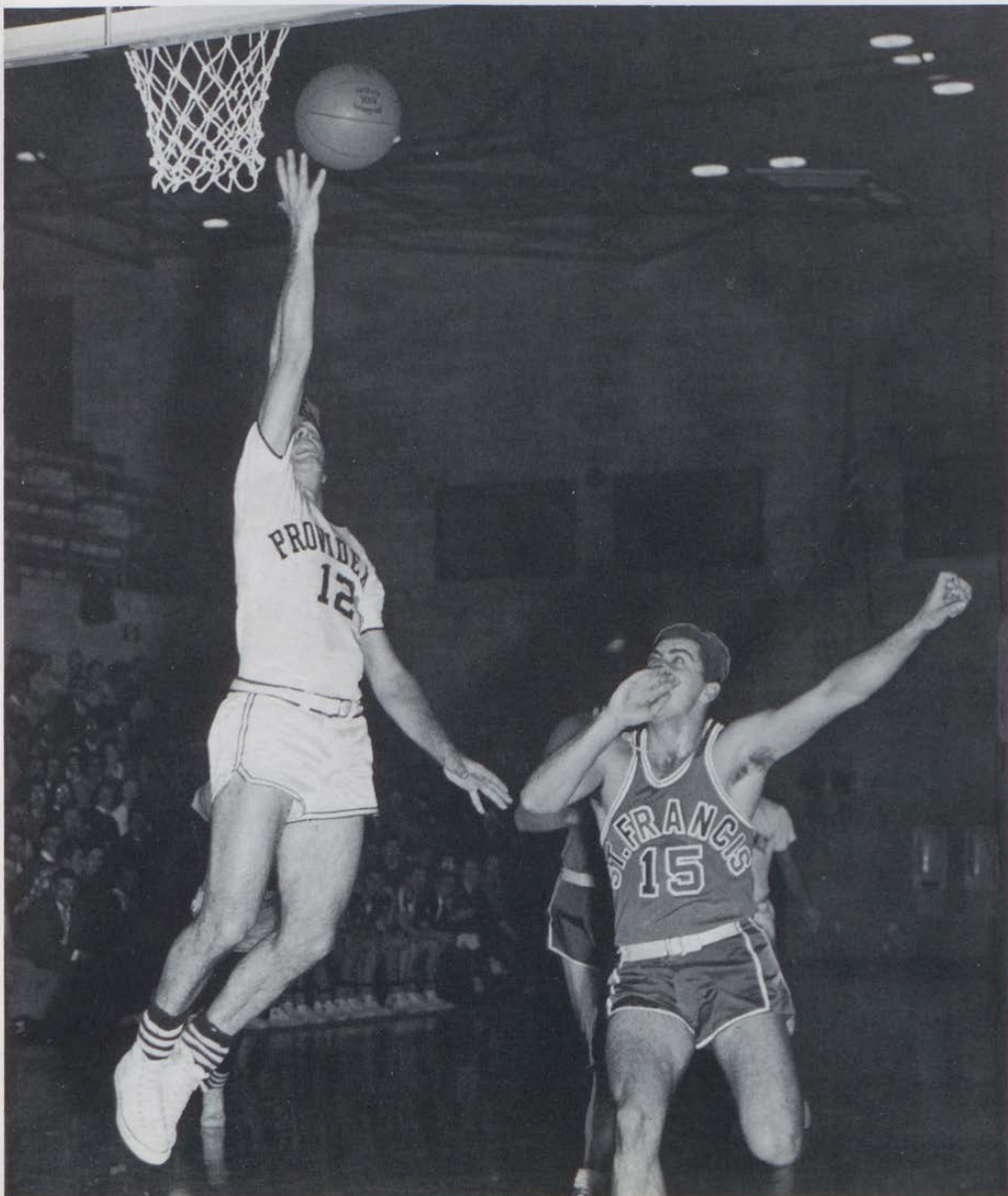


Wally DiMasi is seen in a warm up session.

High Man: DiMasi is there again — this time going up for a rebound.

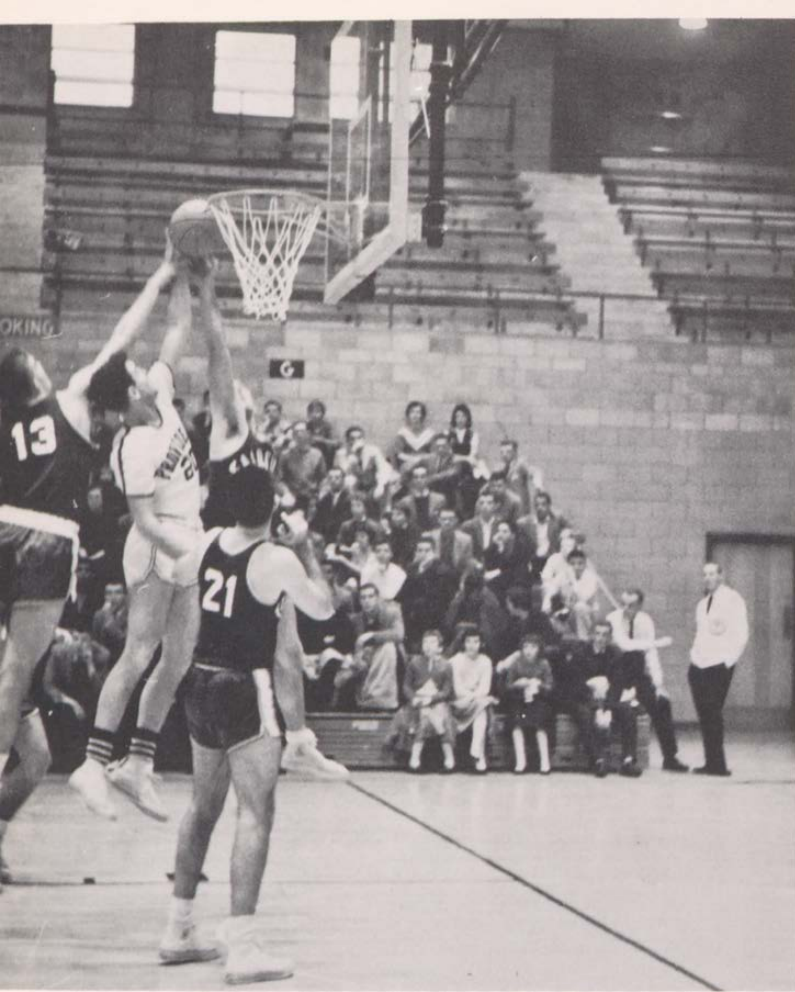


the first basket, swept the Black and White aggregate into a commanding lead which they never relinquished.

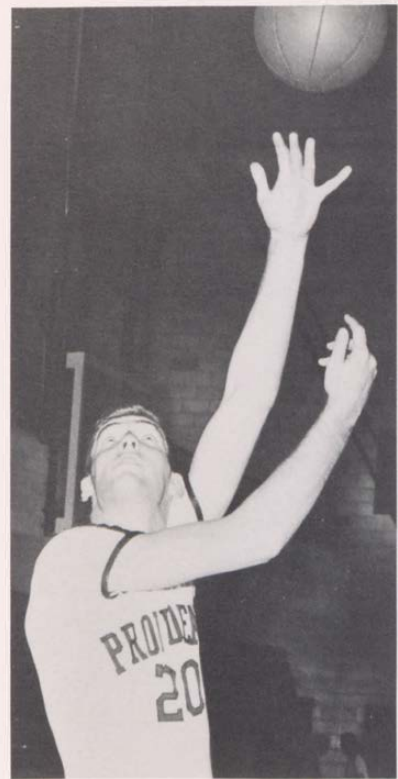
On Jan. 8, the Friars were the un hospitable hosts of Worcester Polytech. The Mulaneymen shut out the visitors for the first eleven minutes due to some fine defensive work by Wilkens and Woods. The second unit played exceptionally well with particular emphasis on the outside shooting of Frank Tirico. At the half-way mark P.C. led 33-14; later they fattened the margin to 55-28, while hitting on 10 of 13 free throws.

The 11th win of the season for the Friars was a 75-46 defeat of Springfield. The Black and White simply outclassed the visitors and at intermission held a 40-19 lead. Four Friars hit for double figures in this one; Jimmy Swartz had 17, Lenny Wilkens 14, Wally DiMasi 12 and Johnny Woods 10.

Providence, undaunted by the visitors tremendous height advantage — they had five men over 6'5" — fought back from an eight point deficit at half-time. The accuracy of Wilkens 19, Swartz 17 and DiMasi 11, almost pulled out one of the season's top thrillers.

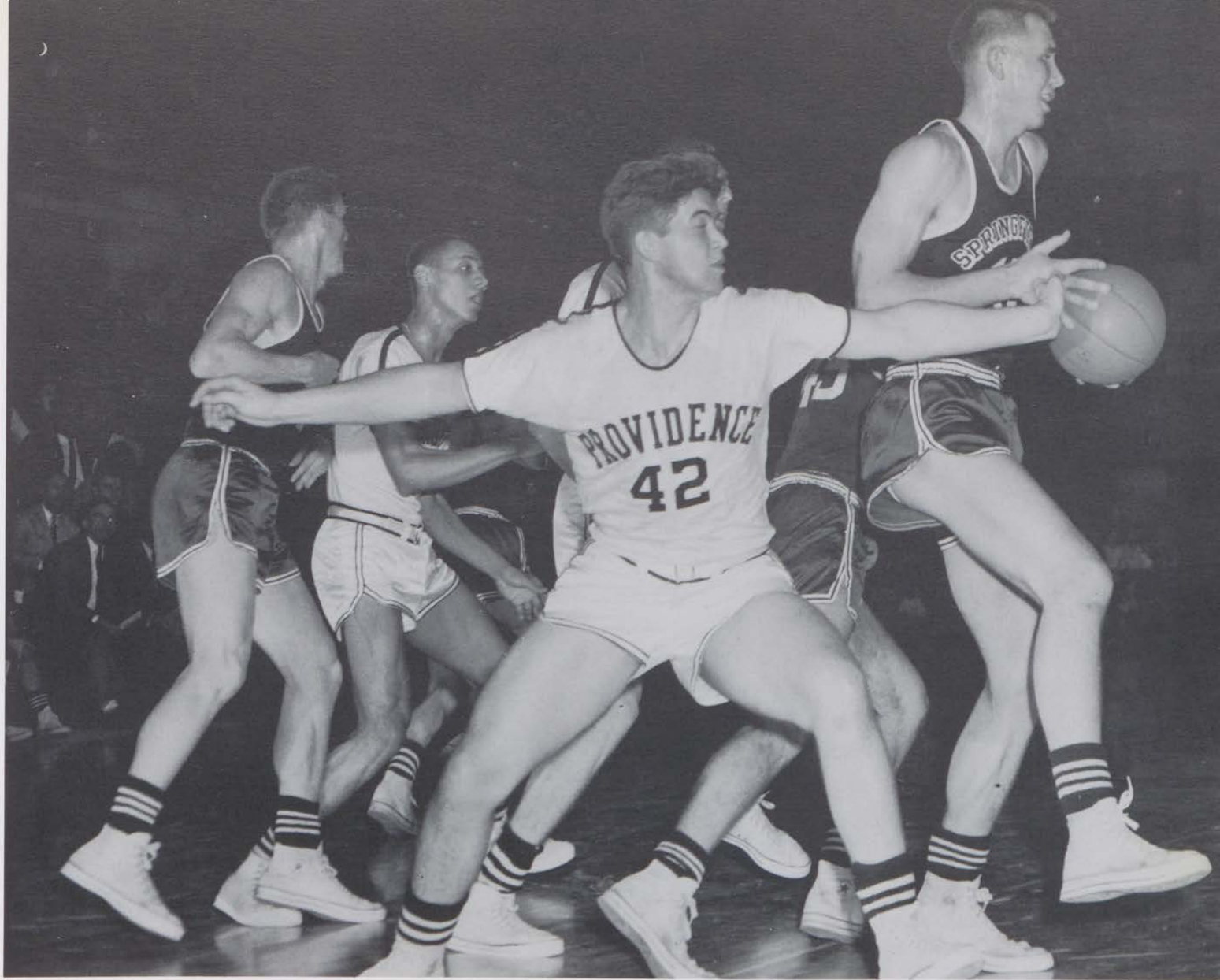
A capacity crowd filled Alumni Hall on January 18th for the Boston University game. Previously undefeated Boston was knocked off in a game to be remembered. The volatile Terrier coach, Matt Zunic was the center of attraction soon after the score had gone to 45-42 with about a minute remaining. Zunic tried to call time out as the clock ticked on. Seconds fled away until finally time was called, when it was discovered that B.U. had taken too many timeouts, and was therefore assessed a technical foul. All of this nearly ended in a battle royal, but tempers finally cooled.

Following an eighteen day layoff because of exams, the Friars returned to action on February 5th at New York where they encountered the Fordham Rams. The game was a nip and tuck affair, and at the end of regulation time the two teams were deadlocked at 49 apiece. 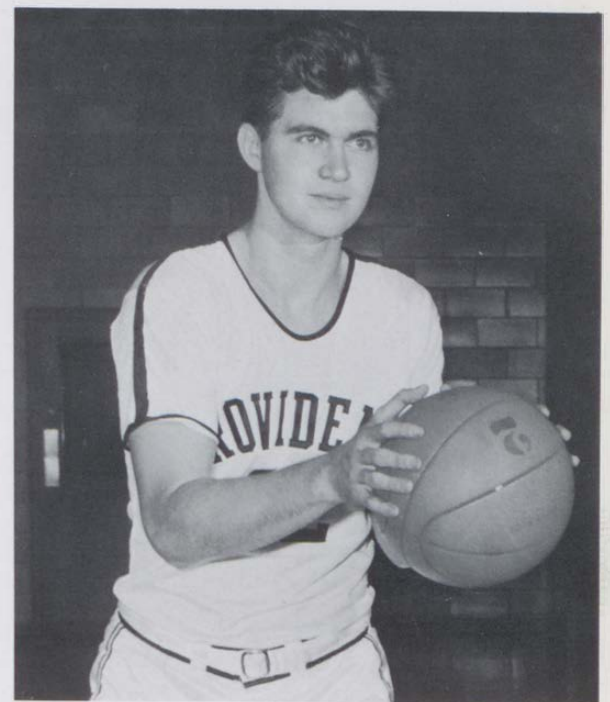

Boston College showed why they received an N.C.A.A. invitation, defeating us, 65-54. The Mullaneymen had an off night and were not up to their usual shooting percentage. The Friars, although trailing 34-26 at the half, kept the score close enough to pull out the decision. The appreciative gallery, here as part of Homecoming Weekend, roared as steady Eddie Donohue held his team in contention, refusing to falter in the face of St. John's powerhouse. Len Wilkens scored 15 points, most of which he tallied in the first half. Jim Swartz took charge at the opening of the second half enabling the Friars to close the gap and eventually assume the lead. The game also featured some fine work by Lionel Jenkins.

The traditional battle between Providence College and Holy Cross, with a ten-

Trailing by a point with 3½ minutes remaining, Swartz, DiMasi and Jenkins all hit safely to register a 56-52 victory over Siena College at Albany, N.Y. Lionel Jenkins was the unsung hero of the Sunday contest. Entering the game in the 2nd half after Woods had fouled out, the "Big-Train" controlled both boards and his two fouls clinched the victory. Lenny Wilkens and Wally DiMasi paced the Friar scoring with 19 and 14 points, respectively.

The first face-off for the Friars' 1957-58 season took place against American International College at the Rhode Island Auditorium on November 30. Coach Tom Eccleston, starting his second year at the P.C. helm, was hoping that his squad would maintain its record of never having lost under him on home ice.

The skaters came through with a 6-1 victory. Captain Lou LaFontaine and Joe Barile, last season's high scorers, took only 35 seconds to pick up where they left off as Lou took a set-up from Joe and blasted home a 30 footer. LaFontaine scored a second goal in the next period. George Boudreau matched this with a pair of his own and Paul Sainato and Bob Labbe completed the scoring.

In the first major Eastern College upset of the season P.C. turned in a tremendous overall performance in topping Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute 4-2 before 3,000 R.I. Auditorium spectators.

On the night following the R.P.I. upset, P.C. defeated Norwich University in another home contest. LaFontaine, Boudreau and John Turner were unable to play in this one due to injuries incurred in the

Rensselaer game. Al McMahon, the Labbe twins, and Joe Barile took over and set a torrid pace. The Friars had a 5-0 lead at the end of two periods. Norwich managed to score three quick goals, but that was all and P.C. notched a 7-3 win.

Coming from behind and hitting stride midway through the second period, P.C. downed Princeton 5-2 on the loser's ice in Princeton, N.J. The winners started slowly but the power line of Al McMahon, Bob Labbe, and Ray Labbe got Providence off and rolling.

P.C. got its first goal at the 13 minute mark of the second period with Princeton ahead by one. Blanchette tied the score and a minute later McMahon hit and put the Friars in front to stay. McMahon hit again at 19:09 and completely turned the hat trick in the final period. Ray Labbe also scored in the wrap-up.

On December 15th, the P.C. skaters extended their victory skein to five with a 7-3 defeat over Loyola of Montreal at the Rhode Island Auditorium. After a fine first period, in which Len Trinque and Pete Bergen had given the Friars a 2-0 lead, the Black and White were pressed and entered the final stanza leading by a

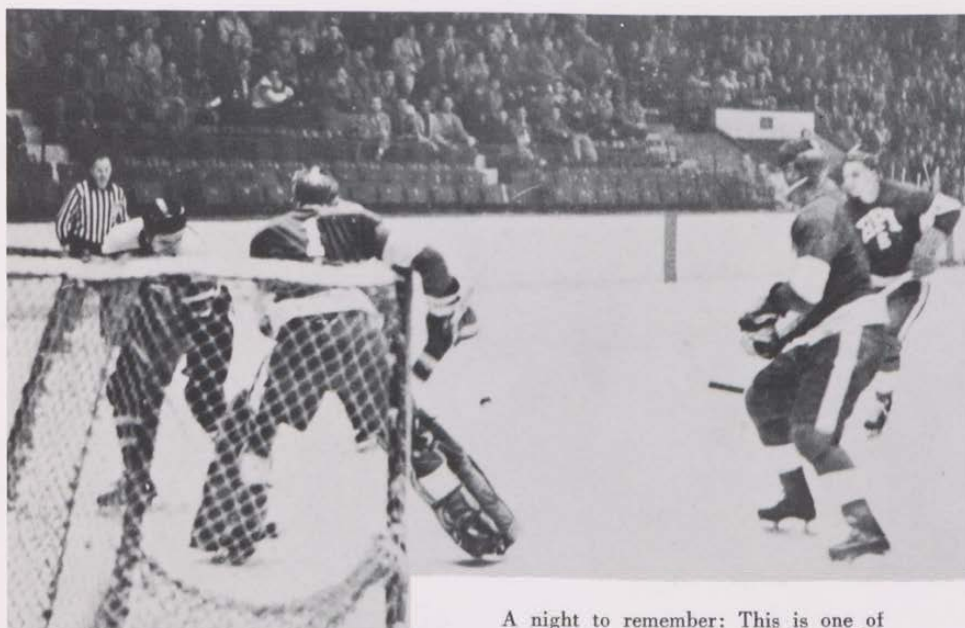

The odds were stacked too heavily against the Friars and they took a 7-3 defeat. The story is told in the performances



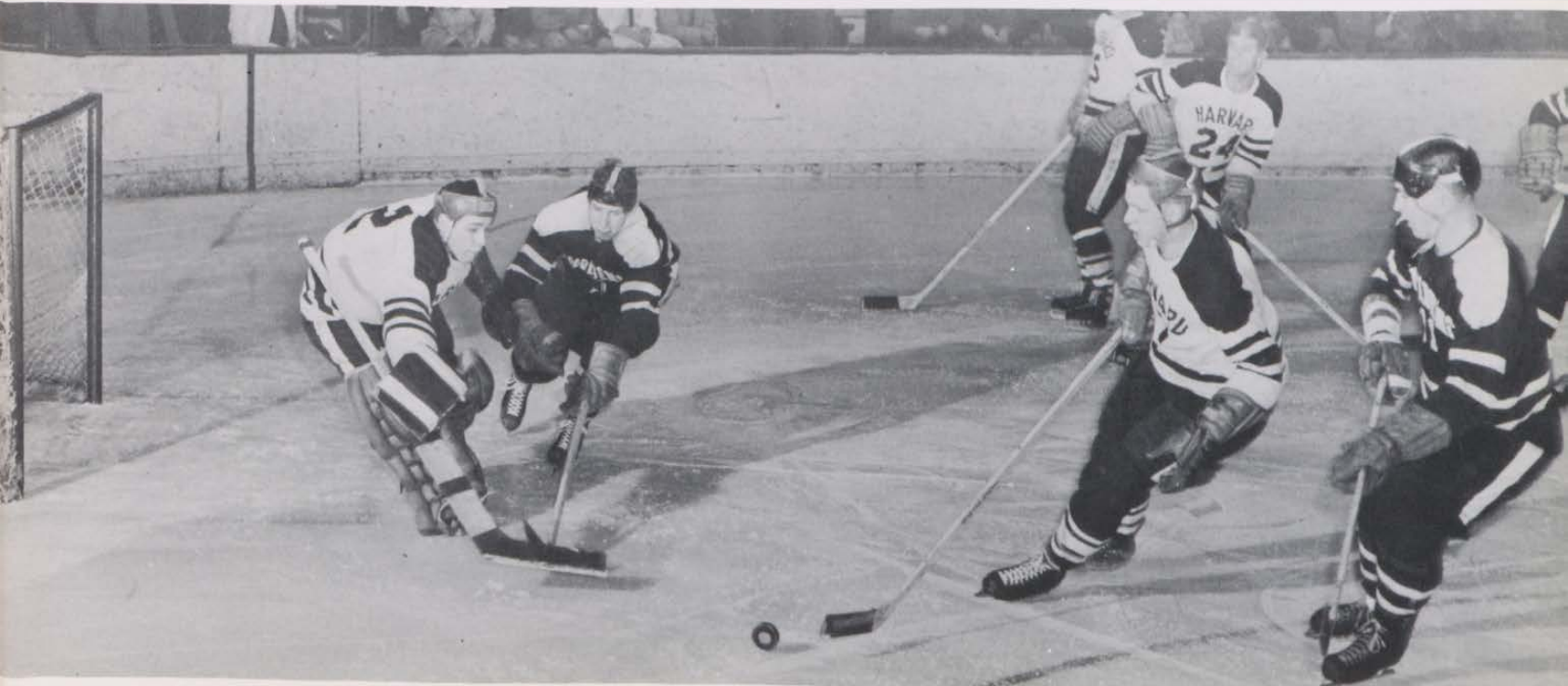
A score of A.I.C. and P.C. hockey players end up sprawled on the auditorium ice.

of the goalies. The Terrier goaltender had only 9 stops while Don Girard played brilliantly for Providence with 27 saves to his credit.

Joe Barile's spectacular scoring effort highlighted the P.C. victory over Northeastern in their tourney game. Barile registered four goals and assisted on three more tallies as we romped over the Huskies 10-2.

In addition to Barile, sophomore Jack Blair figured prominently in the Friars' offensive burst by scoring three times and registering one assist. P.C.'s defense held up well during the triumph as goalies Don Girard and Jim Toomey had to turn away only nine shots.

The third game of the tournament for the Friars matched them against Boston

College. B.C. struck for two quick goals in the first five minutes. Lou LaFontaine scored at 12:01 with an assist from Joe Barile to make the score 2-1 and keep the Black and White in the game. Boston scored a third goal just before the end of the period and although the Friars bombarded the Eagle goal in the second canto, they could not tally. The final segment saw B.C. wrap up the game and take a 5-2 win.

A five goal splurge in the second period was P.C.'s big factor in the 6-5 win over

Northeastern in the North Shore Sports Arena in Lynn, Mass. Capt. Lou LaFontaine scored two of the Friar's goals in the blitz and ended with three goals. Bob Labbe registered a goal and five assists to insure victory.

Regaining some of its early season form, P.C.'s hockey team won its first game over Boston College when they downed the Eagles 4-2. It was the Friar's ninth victory in thirteen starts and avenged an earlier loss to B.C. in the Christmas Tourney.

Led by football star Pete Dawkins, Army played an overwhelming game. The Friars got only 24 shots at the cage as the cadets defense was virtually impenetrable.

One week after their brilliant defeat of St. Lawrence, the Friars traveled to Canton, N.Y., for another game with the Larries. The early moments of the game saw St. Lawrence leading 1-0. The second period was not good for Providence, though Joe Barile had tied it up at 19:34 of the first period. Puppy Gingell's goal in the final period was the only other P.C. score. St. Lawrence had its revenge 7-2.

Harvard University came to Providence on February 8th for the first of two meetings with our hockey six. A perennial power in hockey, the Crimson was contained in the first canto but managed to score once for a slim lead. The second period blues beset the Friars with the opposition uncorking a 4 goal barrage. George Boudreau and Bob Labbe put P.C. on the board, but the third period saw the Friars go down to a 9-3 defeat with Ray Blancette's goal the final Providence tally.

Boston College won the rubber game of its seasons series with Providence when it nipped the Friars 3-2 on Tom Mahoney's goal with six seconds left to play.

The embattled Friars jumped off to a 2-0 lead, but lost their steam in the second period and except for a spell in the third period were outplayed by the smoother skating B.C. sextet. Only Jim Toomey's sensational goal tending prevented the Eagles from breaking the game wide open. He kicked out 36 shots, six of which were "goal labeled."

Captain Lou LaFontaine got P.C. off on the right foot when he scored early in the first period and the Friars made it 2-0 on Boudreau's score at 16:00 of the same session. Dick Kane scored twice for the B.C. sextet, while Mahoney's important tally came on an assist from Cassidy.

Boston University's tourney-bound hockey team erupted for eight goals in the second period and defeated the visitors 10-1 at the Boston Arena. George Boudreau scored P.C.'s only goal at 18:38 of the final period when he beat goalie Hank Levin on a three footer after Bob Labbe and Joe Barile had maneuvered the puck in from the blue line.

The Friars lone goal came in the first period when Ray Blanchette scored after assists by George Gingell and Gil Domingue. Despite the size of the score, Jim Toomey was exceptional in the nets, pushing aside 35 Harvard tries.

Turning in a tremendous performance behind the inspirational leadership of Capt. Lou LaFontaine, the Friar hockey team gained a split in the intra-city series with Brown by trouncing the Bruins 5-2. The P.C. club finished the season in fine fashion before 2,500 cheering spectators at the R.I. Auditorium.

P.C. set a fast pace from the opening whistle and, backboned by some fine goal tending by Don Girard, grabbed an early lead and were never headed. Keeping the Bruins hemmed in, the Friars got the first goal when Joe Barile picked up Dave Morton's block of a Ray Blanchette blast and fired a high shot into the right corner from 20 feet out. Here the quartet of Gus Scannapieco, Tom Cummings, Ed McNamara and Jim Baker showed their backs to Massachusetts, Northeastern and Boston College. Gus Scannapieco, lead-off man, powered his way through a 52.2 second first quarter and passed the baton to Tom Cummings. Cummings, a seasoned board performer, put his experience to good use as he fought the persistent challenges of his opponents and gradually built up a ten yard lead. His time was :53.2, and Cummings passed to Ed McNamara.

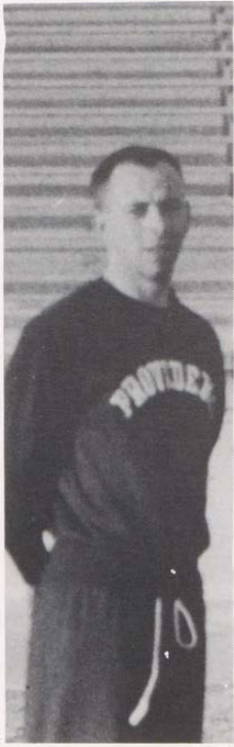
McNamara increased the margin which Cummings had given to him and was clocked at :53.3 for the third leg. McNamara handed off to Jim Baker and Jim turned in a fine :52.3 anchor leg as the mile relay team posted their first victory.

The next competition for the mile-relay team was January 25 in the Washington Star Games. P.C.'s opponents were William and Mary and Brown University.

The Friars held a slight edge over their opponents after Scannapieco, Cummings, and McNamara had run their quarters. Jim Baker, running the anchor leg, started off well, but was tripped and fell to the floor. The William and Mary anchor man took the

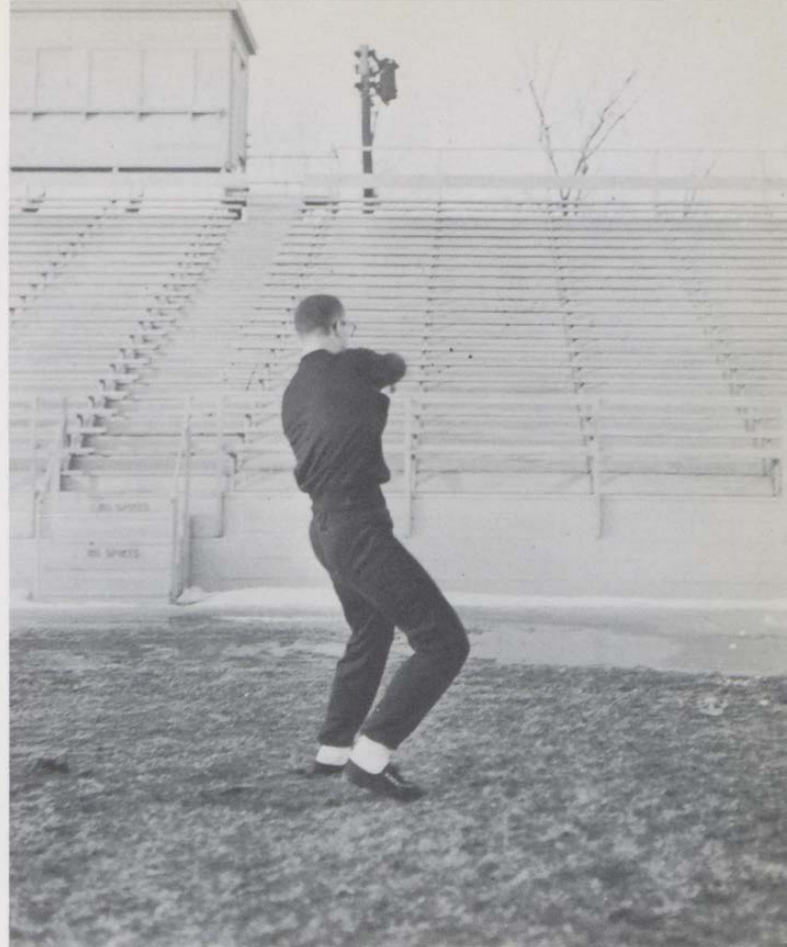
The Providence College relay team journeyed to Boston a week later to prove their abilities. The foursome of Scannapieco, Cummings, McNamara and Baker opposed the Brown, Boston College and Northeastern quartets. Scannapieco ran his opening quarter in :51.0 and this highlighted the Providence victory. The time of 3:30.1 placed the Friars six yards ahead of Brown as Boston College edged Northeastern for third place.

The relay team visited Madison Square Garden in New York City and tasted defeat for the first time. The Friars were opposed by N.Y.U., Rhode Island, Brown and M.I.T. Scannapieco managed to stay even in the opening quarter, but the Violets of N.Y.U. moved ahead even though Tom Cummings gave his best. McNamara, running the third leg for P.C., slipped to fourth place behind N.Y.U., Rhode Island and Brown. Providence was still in contention when Baker took the baton from McNamara. Baker churned his way through the final quarter and P.C. finished third behind winners N.Y.U. and second place Rhode Island. The Friars' third place time of 3.29.2 was their best clocking of the season.

Harry Coates brought his mile relay team back to New York for the New York A.C. Games. The Friars faced their most formidable competition to date in La Salle, Colgate, Boston College, and Seton Hall. Gus Scannapieco battled Colgate's lead-off man and the Friars were two yards off the pace when Tom Cummings took the stick. Cummings held his own, but La Salle's famed Olympian, Ira Davies, roared to the front with Colgate holding second and P.C. third. In the third quarter La Salle maintained the lead, but the Friars' Ed McNamara cut the distance between P.C. and Colgate. Jim Baker took the baton from McNamara and started the anchor leg with the Black and White still in third position.

Baker set out with grim determination and powerful strides. Jim continued at this pace and slowly cut the margins of La Salle and Colgate. On the last turn, Jim charged past the La Salle and Colgate runners and broke the tape three yards ahead of La Salle's anchor man. The Friars' winning time was 3:27.6 and Jim Baker's anchor leg was a scintillating :49.5.

The 1958 indoor track season is completed, but it must be conceded that with their abilities and keen sense of competition, the team of Scannapieco, Cummings, McNamara and Baker will continue its winning ways in the future.

SAILING CLUB

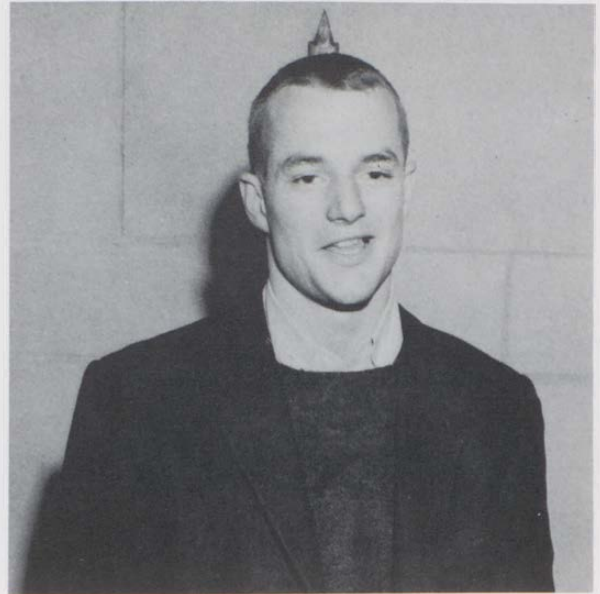

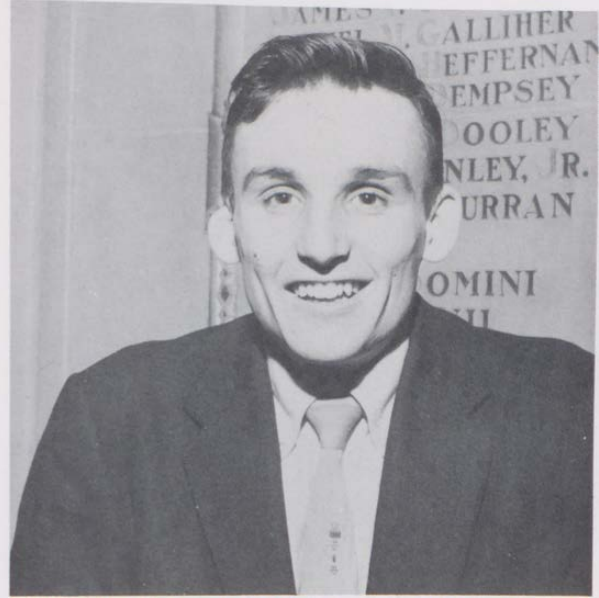
SPIKED SHOE CLUB

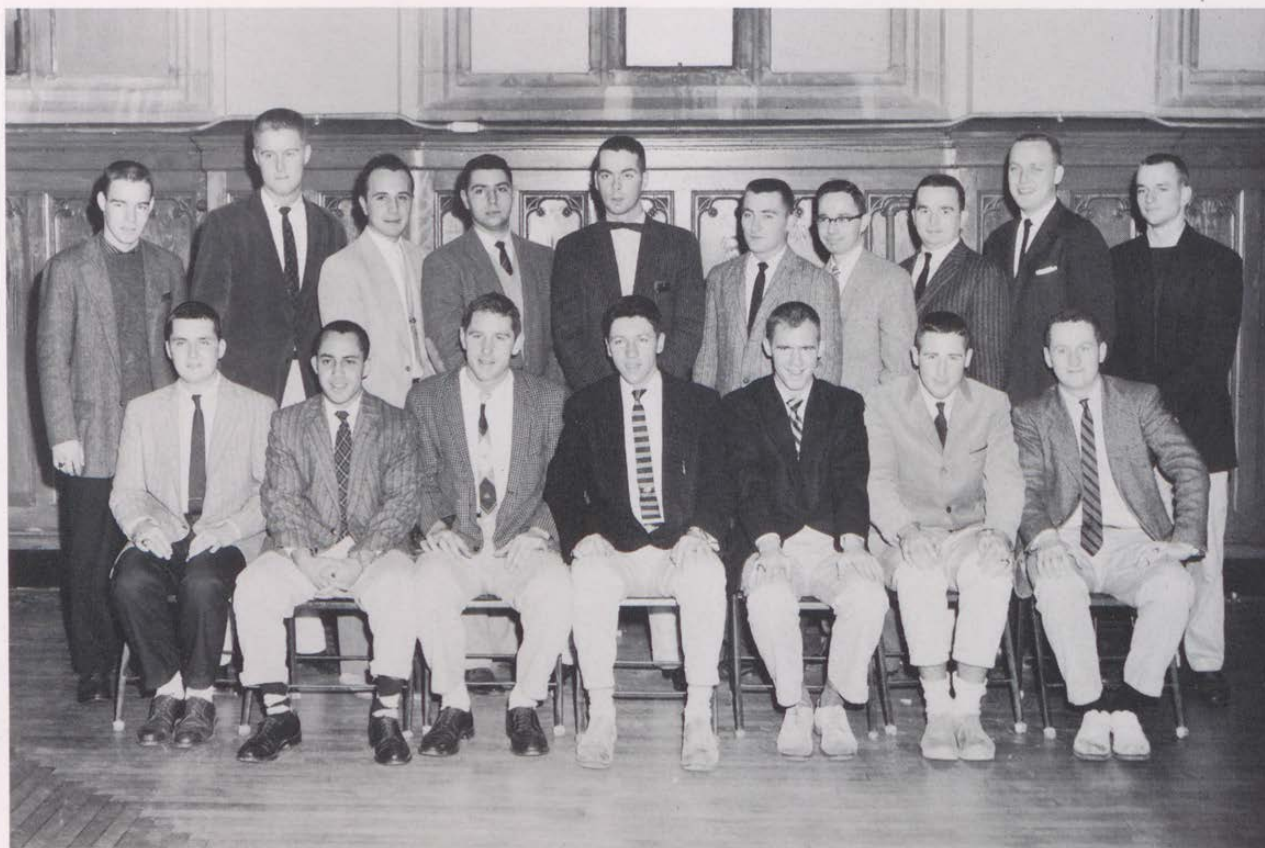

The Council's program includes football, cross-country, and basketball.

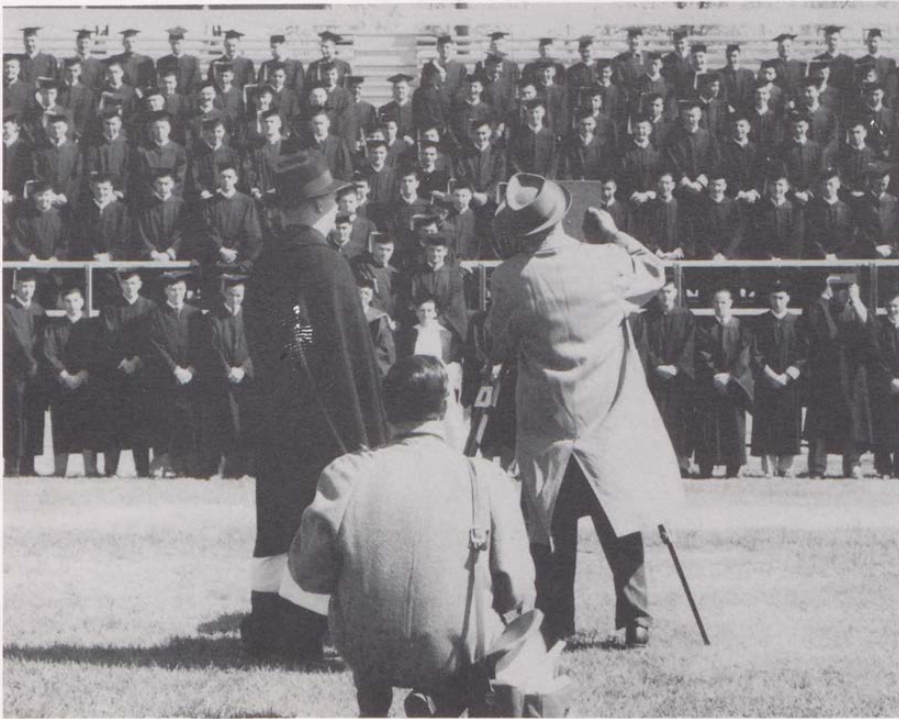
