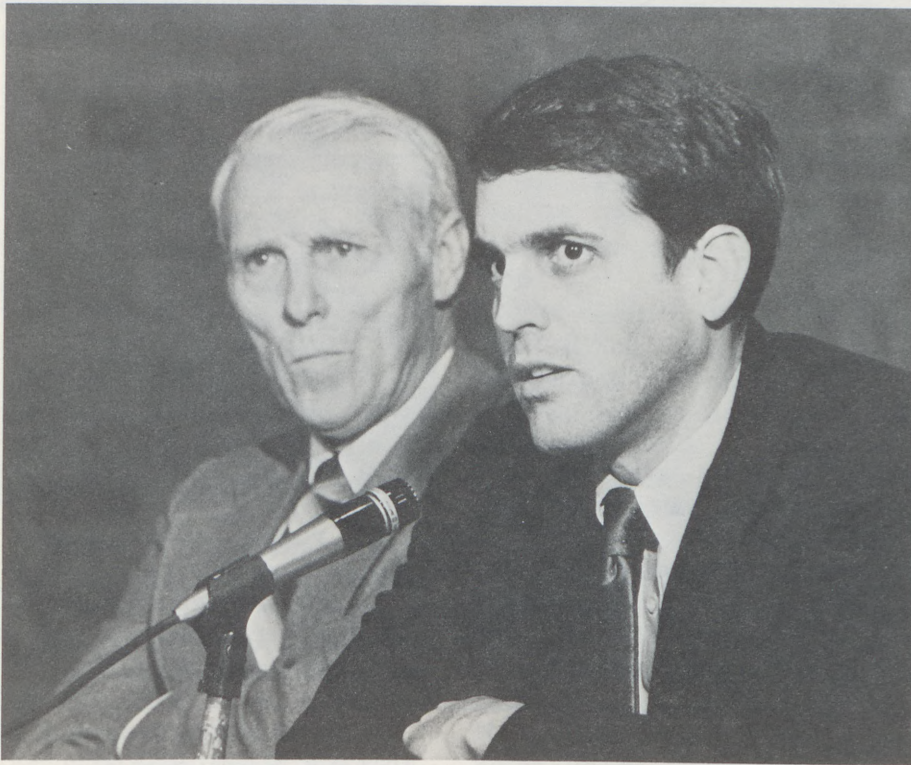

GARY WALTERS RESIGNS JOE MULLANEY RETURNS

Gary Walters has resigned as head basketball coach at Providence College and is being succeeded by Joe Mullaney, PC Athletic Director Dave Gavitt announced Monday, April 6th, at an afternoon news conference held on campus.

Walters, 35, who has coached the Friars for the past two years, said he was stepping down to pursue other opportunities, either in the private sector or in athletics. Before coming to PC, Walters served as head coach at Middlebury, Union and Dartmouth and compiled a 10-year combined head coaching record of 125-124.

Mullaney, 55, the head coach at Brown University the last three years, will actually be returning to PC where he helped build the Friars into a national basketball power in the 1950's and 1960's. During his 14 seasons as head coach at PC (1955-1969), Mullaney compiled a 271-94 record.

"This obviously has been a very difficult decision," said Walters. "I am a very intense person and I set certain standards for myself that I expect to uphold in terms of my performance. I really felt that over this past year or so, I've had a very difficult time sustaining that level of intensity and living up to certain expectations that I had for myself," Walters told 350 newsmen, students, faculty, administrators and PC supporters.

Commenting on his successor, Walters described Mullaney as a man who is "eminently qualified and represents all that is good about college athletics."

Mullaney said he was "delighted at the opportunity to return to PC. In retrospect, the happiest years of my life were coaching at Providence College. I'm just happy to get the (continued on page 6)

CONSTRUCTION OF NEW THEATRE APPROVED BY PC CORPORATION

At its recent meeting, the Providence College Corporation voted unanimously to "authorize the Administration of the College to build a theatre at the time in which it could be financed without borrowing funds to do so."

This decision represents the culmination of work begun a year ago by a committee formed by President Thomas R. Peterson, O.P., charged to study the feasibility of constructing a theatre at Providence College. Chaired by Dr. Richard Grace, and comprised of members of the college administration,

INTERDISCIPLINARY MAJOR IN AMERICAN STUDIES ADDED TO CURRICULUM

Providence College President, Very Reverend Thomas R. Peterson, O.P., has approved a proposal by the PC Faculty Senate to initiate a new academic concentration in the field of American Studies, beginning next September.

The new American Studies major will be an interdisciplinary program studying the history, literature, culture and institutions that constitute the American experience. Undergraduates will be able to design their program of study according to individual needs and interest by selecting from courses

currently offered in the college curriculum and by enrolling in junior-senior seminars that will address specific topics in American Studies. Over 325 American colleges offer programs in American Studies, and more than 240 of these grant BA degrees in the field.

To major in American Studies, the following 30 credits are required: 6 hours of basic U.S. History; 12 hours in the Humanities, Social Studies or Arts; and 12 hours in the junior-senior seminars, which will explore America from an interdisciplinary perspective.

The only requirement for those who will be sophomores in the coming academic year will be 6 hours of U.S. History.

The American Studies Program will provide a solid background for students interested in professional studies such as law, MBA programs, other graduate studies or careers, in government, journalism, teaching, civil service or communications.

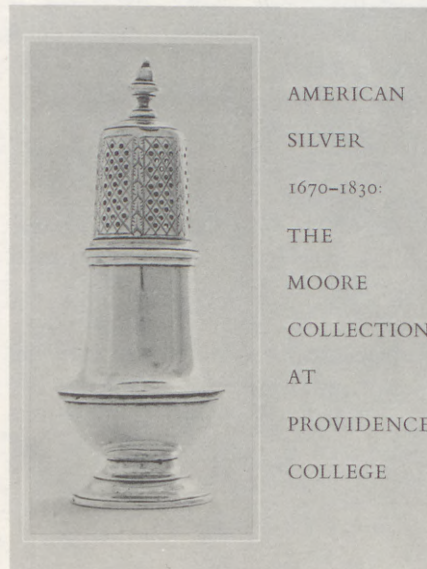
CATALOGUE OF PC SILVER COLLECTION PUBLISHED

Providence College, aided by a grant from the Rhode Island Bicentennial Foundation, has published a limited edition catalogue of the Cornelius C. Moore collection of 18th century American silver. Entitled "American Silver 1670 - 1830: The Cornelius C. Moore Collection at Providence College," the publication is a thoroughly researched and richly illustrated collection of essays as well as a catalogue of more than 200 examples of colonial era silver from the New England region.

Cornelius C. Moore, Newport attorney and civic leader, willed his collection - which includes the largest group of Rhode Island silver in a private collection - to PC, along with his library of reference works and correspondence related to the collection. The Moore papers are chronologically filed in the PC archives.

Moore began his collection in the 1940's, and by 1960 the collection

had grown to the point where it made an interesting statement about 18th century New England silver. His collection was presented in public display at the Rhode Island Historical Society in 1961. Moore

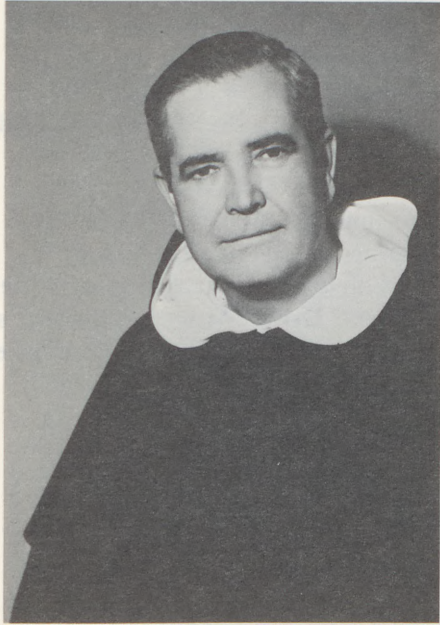
had hoped to further share his collection with the public by publishing a catalogue; however, preliminary work on the publication was halted when Moore died in August, 1970.

Under the editorial supervision of Alice H.R. Hauck, assistant professor of Art History, five PC students, Anne E. Spokas, Karolyn Kras, Anne M. Skarzynski, Kimberly A. Kyle and Emily Kean, revived the catalogue project in a senior seminar on art historical research methods during the 1978-79 academic year. Each student selected a geographical and chronological period of interest, and as a group they prepared an extensive bibliography on American silver and silversmiths.

The limited edition of 1,000 hand numbered copies, produced by the Stinehour Press and the Meriden Gravure Co., is a tribute to the possibilities of undergraduate group scholarship, and to Mr. Moore's thoughtfulness in donating his reference works, papers and silver collection to PC.

KENNETH C. SULLIVAN, O.P.
1910 - 1981



Rev. Kenneth C. Sullivan, O.P., former Provincial of the Dominican Fathers of the Province of St. Joseph, died March 18 in St. Louis Bertrand Church in Louisville, Kentucky, where he had served since 1979. As Provincial of the Dominican Fathers in the eastern province from 1967-1972, he also served as President of the Providence College Corporation from May '68 to June '73.

During Father Sullivan's presidency of the college corporation, the governing board of the school, a Task Force on Coeducation was formed to study admitting women, and the school became coeducational in 1971. Fr. Sullivan received an honorary doctor of laws degree from the college in 1968.

From 1956 to 1965, Father Sullivan was pastor of St. Pius Parish in Providence, and during that time, the parish built the modern church structure on Eaton Street.

Born August 1, 1910 in East St. Louis, Illinois, Father Sullivan was the youngest of 13 children of the late John and Margaret (Murphy) Sullivan of Illinois.

He attended St. Mary's and St. Joseph's parochial schools and public high school in East St. Louis. He was a member of the Class of '31 from Providence College. His studies as a novice began at the Novitiate of St. Rose, Springfield, Kentucky, and continued at the House of Philosophy in River Forest, Illinois. He completed his study of Theology at the Dominican House of Studies in Washington, DC and was ordained at St. Dominic's Church in that city on

June 10, 1936.

After ordination, he was assigned to Sacred Heart Parish, Jersey City, NJ (1937-1942); and St. Antoninus Parish in Newark, NJ (1943-1955). Following his nine years as pastor and prior of St. Pius Church, Providence, Fr. Sullivan was appointed pastor of St. Gertrudes's Church, Cincinnati, Ohio. From 1973 to 1979, he served as pastor of St. Raymond's Church in Providence.

Fr. Sullivan is survived by a sister, Mrs. Margaret Niemann of St. Louis, Missouri, and two brothers, Joseph Sullivan of Seattle, Washington, and Robert Sullivan of Collinsville, Illinois, and several nieces and nephews.

A Mass of Christian Burial was held March 21 at St. Louis Bertrand Church in Louisville, with the Most Reverend Thomas McDonough, Archbishop of Louisville serving as principal celebrant. The Very Reverend William B. Ryan, O.P., Prior of the Dominican community at Providence College delivered the eulogy, and over 40 Dominican priests participated as concelebrants. Burial was in the Dominican Community Cemetery at St. Rose's Priory, Springfield, Kentucky.

FINALE APPROACHES FOR 80-81 DRIVE

With little more than two months remaining, the 1980-81 Loyalty Fund Campaign speeds toward a June 30th finish already \$100,000 ahead of last year's figures in total pledges.

The Class Phonathons, which constitute the third and final phase of the drive, were held on the campus April 13-21. Results of this phase will be published in the next issue of *Update*. The six decade chairpersons: Henry T. Kaveny '27, Bernard J. Buonanno '32, Wallace R. Tasca '40, Stephen A. Fanning, Esq. '50, John E. Martinelli, Esq. '65 and Susan McCutchan '75 together with the class agents (listed below) assisted the Development Office in coordinating these phonathons.

Last year, the Fund broke all previous records with 7,405 gifts for over \$590,000. As of March 31st, the Campaign has already received over 6,700 pledges totaling \$637,666.

While pleased with the results to date, Chairman Voll expresses concern over the final weeks of the campaign. "Our goal of \$650,000 is the largest in the history of the college. If we are to achieve this objective, it is vital that our class efforts prove successful, and hopefully improve upon last year's alumni participation rate of 41% which is especially important because of the influence this has on obtaining gifts from other sources."

Chairman Voll asks that anyone who has not yet pledged to the 80-81 campaign to please do so as soon as possible, so as to minimize the financial expenses and volunteer time needed to wrap-up the fund solicitation.

PARENTS DRIVE SUCCESSFUL UNDER FORBES' LEADERSHIP

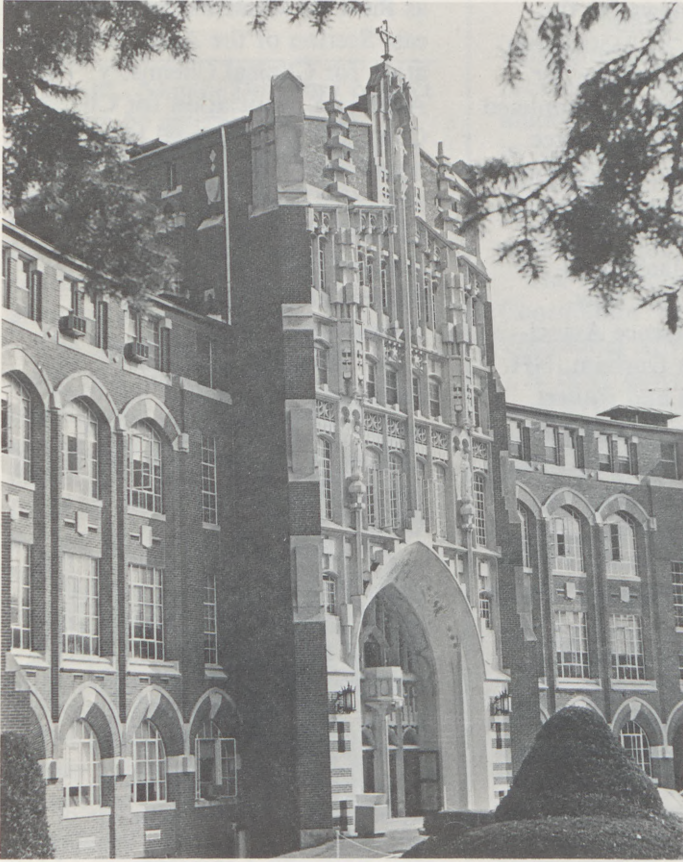

CAREER CENTER FOCUSES ON CURRENT STUDENT NEEDS

During the past few years, the Counseling and Career Planning Center at PC has become one of the most utilized service centers available to undergraduate students.

Designed as a multi-faceted developmental center, the staff assists individuals and groups in gathering information and selecting appropriate strategies in matters of personal, educational and vocational concerns. According to Jacqueline Kiernan, Director of the Center, part of this positive orientation involves counseling students to resolve and cope with normal conflicts, such as problems with roommates, test anxiety, and management of personal crisis situations that may occur.

Developmental activities aimed at undergraduates include a wide range of workshops and seminars that

address issues and skills relevant to personal and vocational growth, encompassing topics such as time management, interpersonal/communication skills and assertiveness training.

Workshops and information sessions on career options are also scheduled on a regular basis to help students make a realistic decision on their future direction. Seniors may also utilize specific workshops on topics such as resume writing, interview techniques and job search campaigns.

John McGrath, Coordinator of Placement Activities, says that nearly every undergraduate comes to the Center at one time or another, to discuss the results of vocational testing, course selection, career development, graduate school plans or personal problems and concerns.

The Center's services are available at no cost to all students, faculty, staff, and alumni of PC. In June,

the Center is co-sponsoring two one-day workshops on job search techniques for alumni. See details on page 7.

1942 - 1981

Dr. Normand Richard Noel, professor of economics at PC for the past 14 years, died Friday, March 27th at his home in Cranston, RI. He was 38 years old.

A native of Woonsocket, RI, Dr. Noel lived in Pawtucket for 33 years before moving to Cranston in 1976. He was the son of Louise (Dennis) Noel of Cranston, and the late Alcide Noel.

Dr. Noel attended St. Raphael Academy in Pawtucket and received his BA degree in economics from Providence College in 1964.

He continued graduate study in economics, receiving both his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in economics from Boston College. A member of the American Economic Association, Dr. Noel joined the PC faculty in 1967.

As a member of the PC faculty, Dr. Noel served as Chairman of the Economics Department from 1978-1980, and as faculty advisor for Omicron Delta Epsilon, the economics honor society. He was also a member of the PC Alumni Association.

A special Scholarship fund has been created in his memory and donations may be made to the Dr. N. Richard Noel Memorial Fund, Providence College.

PUCKSTERS WIN ECAC TITLE; HOOPSTERS FINISH STRONG

The records — 10-18 in basketball, 17-15-1 in hockey — certainly won't go down in the record books as the best ever in those respective sports at Providence College.

But, a big black and white sign — two signs, actually — taped to the windows at Schneider Arena tells it all about PC hockey. In big block letters, the signs read: "Home of the 1981 ECAC Champions."

There were no championships in basketball, but there were some major upsets; four of 'em, matter-of-fact, and some exciting moments in a topsy-turvy season with a young club which had seven freshmen on the roster.

Both teams created quite a stir at the end, hockey coming like heck to win it all and basketball raising eyebrows with those late-season upsets. In between, it was like a roller coaster ride with a lot of emotional peaks and valleys.

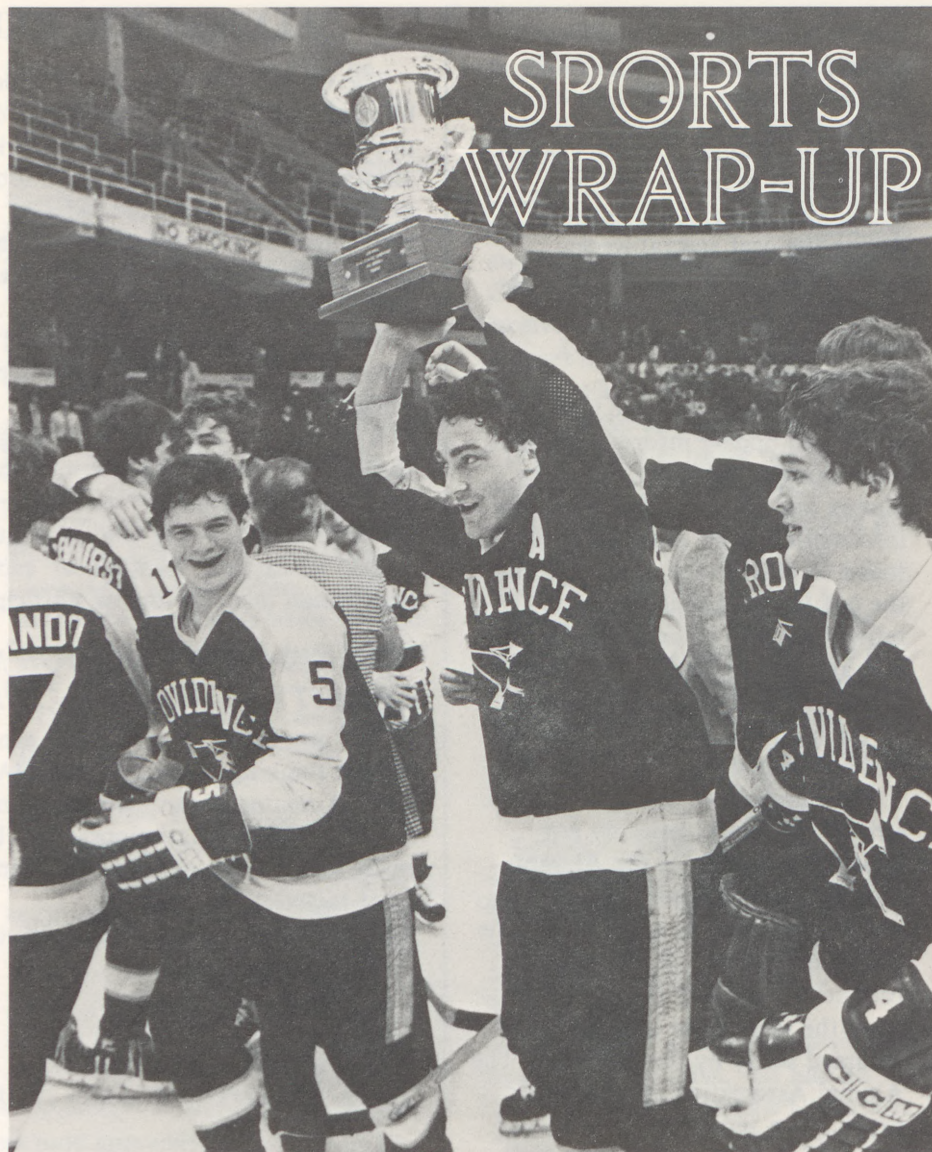
For the hockey club, the final ending was of great personal satisfaction for coach Lou Lamoriello and his staff, not to mention, of course, the 27 players.

To win it all didn't come easy, of course, and the hockey Friars literally had to fight their way into the playoffs. Only then was it a bit easier; or, more precisely, two of the three games ended up being comfortable wins.

As that final record — 17-15-1 — indicates, it was a roller-coaster year. The Friars were only 5-7-1 at home. They were 10-8 on the road and 2-0 on neutral ice. The schedule, though, wasn't easy; not with two trips to Minnesota, a stretch of 44 days without a home game, plus road games at such exciting places as Potsdam, Orono, Canton and Hamilton.

In the end, though, it may have been the difficulty of the schedule which paid dividends because when it counted the most, the Friars won and won on the road in enemy territory.

"Yes, the schedule was difficult," offered Lamoriello. "But we never complained about it because we made it. If anything, it helped us

become a better and stronger team, especially at the end when it counted the most."

Lamoriello and his kids never complained about anything, especially when things weren't going well midway through the season. Nine one goal defeats will tell you part of the story. As well as many injuries which were never mentioned.

Anyway, down the homestretch the Friars went 11-3 and those three defeats were at home. With a week or so left in the regular season, the Friars were in a fairly comfortable playoff position until unexpected, back-to-back losses at home to Cornell and Yale. Suddenly, the picture wasn't as bright. In fact, the final two-games — Maine at home, then the finale in Durham against New Hampshire — ended up **MUST WIN** games.

Sparked by a bench-clearing brawl which seemed to perk up everyone, PC whacked Maine, 12-4, but lost five players because of misconducts who would have to sit out the finale, at UNH.

So, up North went the Friars with only 13 skaters and two goalies. Before the second period, they were down to 11; one player was hurt, the other out with a misconduct. And, late in the game, PC trailed by scores of 3-1 and 4-2. Somehow, incredibly, PC regrouped and won in OT, 5-4.

The Friars ended up being seeded seventh in the eight-team playoff field and had to travel to Chestnut Hill to play second-seeded Boston College in the opener. No problem! A comfortable 5-2 win in a game the Friars dominated from the opening faceoff.

Now, to the Boston Garden for

the third time in the past four years for the finals. What happened there is unbelievable.

The semifinal game was against Clarkson, the No. 1 team in the East and the No. 2 team in the country. For 59 minutes, the Golden Knights were in complete control, though holding "only" a 3-1 lead.

Somehow, again incredibly, PC pulled out a victory like a magician pulls a dove out of a hat. Two goals within 30 seconds in the final minute to tie, then another overtime for a 4-3 win. The majority of the fans had left in the final couple of minutes, with the so-called answer, "to beat the traffic," and didn't know the Friars pulled it out until reading the morning paper.

The final, for the silver cup, seemed almost anticlimatic, even though it was to be against old nemesis Cornell. The final was an 8-4 PC runaway and cheers thundered down from the Old North Station ice house as Lamoriello's young men, in those sharp black and white uniforms, skated around the ice — and under those Bruin and Celtic championship banners — with their sticks in the air and senior Steve Evangelista holding the cup over his head.

The season came to an abrupt end with two defeats at home in the NCAA quarterfinals to Michigan Tech of the Western Hockey League, but the memory of what the Friars did at the end of the regular season, and then in the playoffs, still is vivid in the minds of everyone connected with the PC hockey program.

"There is only one ECAC champion," said a fan leaving Schneider Arena after the Michigan Tech series, "and this year it is Providence. When you look back in the record books years from now, you'll always see the name Providence next to the year 1981 as the ECAC champion. It's everything these kids deserved."

And, looking back, Lamoriello and his players not only can look at that ECAC Cup fondly, but also know in the process they beat the Nos. 1-2-4 seeds in the tournament.

A week before the hockey play-

offs began, the basketball team, it seems, set the tone for the unexpected with a 67-65 victory in the BIG EAST Tournament over regular-season champion Boston College.

Now, the basketball team didn't end up having the ultimate success of the hockey team, yet nonetheless provided some happy moments down the stretch which offers more than a ray of hope and sunshine for new coach Joe Mullaney next year.

The hoopsters came into the BIG EAST tournament ranked eighth, the last place team in the conference. But little Ricky Tucker threw in a 10-foot baseline jumper with two seconds left to beat the top-seeded Eagles by a basket and sent the crowd in Syracuse's massive Carrier Dome into pandemonium and disbelief.

Into the semis went the Friars and up against Villanova. PC had three chances to win it in the final seconds, let those chances slip away and, finally in overtime, the game slipped away.

Down the stretch in the regular season, though, the Friars sent shock waves through the East when, on Inauguration Eve in the nation's Capital, and on Eastern Regional TV, they stunned Georgetown to snap a four-game losing streak. The final was 61-58. It was the first BIG EAST win ever (stretching over a period of a year and a half) for PC and it was the real emergence of a young man who may be the "franchise" for the next three years. Otis Thorpe, a 6-9 freshman, contributed 10 points in the final nine minutes and was a dominant force, as he would prove to be, to other conference foes the rest of the way.

But after the Hoya win followed six more defeats in a row until back-to-back shocking upsets over first Villanova, 82-70, and then St. John's, 73-57. Not only were those Friar wins major upsets, they were convincing, runaway upsets.

Over-all, though, it was an up-and-down year. Even a stormy year. First, Walters learned his best player, Rudy Williams who was the team MVP for two straight years, would miss the first semester

because of academic problems. Then Rudy came back, and somewhat out of shape. The team first had to adjust, to learn to play without Rudy; then readjust to play with him. *(continued on page 16)*

J. VINCENT CUDDY 1921 - 1981



J. Vincent Cuddy, associate director of athletics at Providence College died March 24, at his home in North Providence. He was 59. He had been affiliated with Providence College for 31 years.

Born in Naugatuck, CT, Cuddy attended high school there, and was graduated in 1943 from the University of Connecticut, where he played basketball, baseball and football. In 1947 he received a Masters degree in Physical Education from Columbia University.

In 1949, Cuddy was named head basketball coach at PC, a position he held until 1954. He also served as freshman basketball coach, sports information director, assistant athletic director, business manager for athletics, and most recently, as associate director of athletics.

Mr. Cuddy was voted into the Providence College Hall of Fame in 1977. He had been named PC's Outstanding Faculty member in 1972. and also served as vice president and active member of Words Unlimited.

He is survived by his wife and three sons.

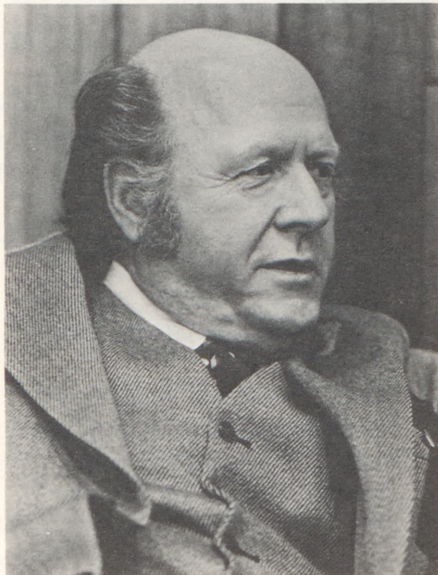

NOMINATIONS BEING ACCEPTED FOR CORPORATION REPRESENTATIVE

The Providence College Alumni Association has two representatives who serve four-year terms as members of the Corporation of Providence College. The terms are staggered so that every two years one ends and a new representative is selected. Accordingly, this year one of these positions will be filled for a term that commences on July 1, 1981.

Active members of the Alumni Association (current Loyalty Fund contributors) are invited to submit the names of fellow Alumni or to place their own names into consideration for this Corporation representative slot.

The nomination and selection procedure is:

1. A letter outlining the reasons for nominating each alumnus and his or her personal resume must be sent to the P.C. Alumni Office — Attention: Screening Committee by May 1st.
2. A committee of the Alumni Board of Governors then screens the nominations and selects the five most worthy candidates. Among the criteria used are professional achievements, record of support for the College, involvement in Alumni Association activities.
3. The full Alumni Board then votes for the five finalists on a point basis.
4. The top two finalists and their background materials are then submitted to the Corporation Nominating Committee which makes the final selection.

The Corporation of Providence College is the major policy-setting authority of the College and currently is made up of thirty-two members.

faculty, and student body, the committee met with the faculties of the Music and Theatre Programs, the Director of Special Events, the chairpersons of the departments of the college, and the college planning committee to discuss the various needs and requirements of such a facility. In addition, an open session to which all members of the college community were invited to voice opinions regarding the proposed facility was held. In the course of all of these sessions, there was great support and encouragement for the project.

The proposed facility is intended to meet the growing cultural needs of the college. The purpose of the building would primarily be to provide performance space for the Music and Theatre Programs, and

eventually to accommodate dance performances. The building would also be available for formal lectures, poetry readings, films of an educational nature, and for certain cultural events sponsored by the Student Board of Governors.

The committee spent much of last spring interviewing representatives from several architectural firms. After evaluating the various firms in terms of the college's needs, the committee submitted to Fr. Peterson the names of possible firms which they recommend, should the project be undertaken.

The projected cost of the performing arts theatre is 2.5 million dollars, with the committee in strong and universal agreement that the facility be designed in keeping with the best technology for energy conservation.

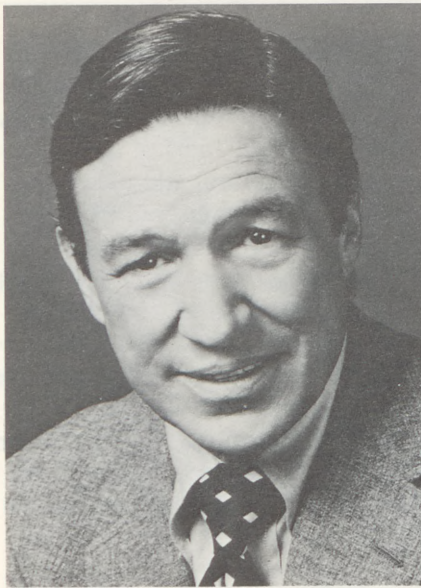
Under their leadership, this year's appeal has enjoyed record success with approximately \$40,000 already raised, a 20% increase over the total raised in last year's record breaking drive.
