

Loyalty Fund Entering Regional Phase

The 1982-83 Loyalty Fund, with its \$850,000 goal, is surging forward as it moves from the special gift phase into the regional phonathon phase. A highly successful round of special gift phonathons was concluded on November 22nd. These phonathons, which included Century, Dean's, Chancellor's, President's, Associate Chairman's, and Chairman's Clubs, amassed 827 gifts totalling \$111,065. These gifts bring the entire Loyalty Fund totals up to 3,549 pledges totalling \$420,100 which is ahead of last year's record pace. Also included in these figures are the results of two very successful pilot regional phonathons held in Denver, Colorado, on November 4th and San Francisco, California on November 10th. Pilot regional phonathons continued on November 30th in Bedford, New Hampshire, and December 2nd in Auburn, Maine. The entire regional phonathon phase begins on January 6th and concludes on March 5th in Boston, in addition to the regular fund appeals mailed from the college throughout the academic year.

New Counseling Service For Alumni

The Alumni Career Services program was established to meet the needs of an increasing number of alumni who have turned to the Counseling Center for employment information and assistance. In the 1980-81 academic year, 288 alumni sought this assistance. In 1981-82, the number exceeded 300.

Several programs and activities will comprise the Alumni Career Services program during its first trial year of part-time operations.
